Patras, Greece August 20, 1958  
Hello Again!  
Holidays are exciting anywhere and my adopted city of Patras is certainly no exception.

Here, however, the day before the holiday receives as much attention as the great day itself.

On the eve of August 15 (the day in question) all of Patras was ablaze with light. As we rode through the city in a friend's car this in itself made the occasion special, it was as though the sun had never set.

King George's Square, Maizonos street and most dazzling of all, St. Nicholas street, glittered brilliantly with hundreds of lights. When the great day dawned at last everyone crowded to their respective churches for this holiday commemoration and death of the Virgin Mary, Mother of Christ.

After a short but impressive service we tramped home for a Greek version of brunch. There was much gaiety in our house as one of my sisters is called Mary and this was her "name day" she was besieged by congratulations from everyone and promptly retaliated in true Greek fashion by presenting each of us with sweets made especially for this occasion.

That night the city was once again ablaze with light. The streets were crowded with people and some of the celebrations ran far into the night.

Saturday, August 16, "the day after," showed no signs of the usual let-down which follows a big holiday. On the contrary, it was filled with anticipation for the water polo game between Patras and Athens scheduled for that evening.


As early as 6:30 p.m. people began to gather in the special area reserved for this event.

Races were held first and as each one was called our Greek friends would patiently explain which swimmers were "ours." But it was the water polo game which held everyone, even us fidgety Americans, transfixed. Being avid football fans ourselves, we yelled louder than anyone and in doing so drew some pretty curious stares from the other spectators.

Victory, although very close, was not to be ours, however, and the game ended Athens, 3; Patras, 2.

The following afternoon we were all back for more and this time our cheering paid off. The final score was Patras, 4; Athens, 2, and we marched triumphantly up St. Nicholas street under the blazing arcs of light shouting the news to anyone who would listen. So ended a weekend filled with all the excitement and fun the little city of Patras is capable of. It is surely one I will never forget.


