

Contract For SHS Awarded

A low bid of \$1,614,195 for construction of the third unit of South High School was awarded Tuesday night by the Torrance Board of Education. The low bid was more than \$40,000 less than the low bids two months ago which were rejected by the board. The bids were rejected then on the basis of cost. At the same time, plans to build a football stadium were dropped from the plans at this time, because of lack of funds. Lowest of seven bidders was the Oliver Construction Co. Scheduled to be built in this unit are two two-story classroom wings, three shop rooms, a library, and cafeteria. The money also includes equipment to furnish these classrooms. Officials hope that the buildings will be ready for the opening of school in September, 1959, when the school will have seniors for the first time. A fourth unit of construction, including more classrooms and a music building, will be constructed later.
