Jefferson School Opens Nov. 10, Relieves Load

The new Jefferson School, 21717 Talisman St. is expected to open Monday, Nov. 10, barring any last minute difficulties, according to school officials. Some 491 pupils will be enrolled when the new school opens. This figure includes 331 students now attending classes at Meadow Park, 42 handicapped youngsters, 90 kindergarteners at Calle Mayor School, and 28 partially sighted children now at Perry School.

Double session problems at Meadow Park and Perry will be relieved by the opening. Neither Meadow Park nor Perry will have any double sessions, while the fourth grade will go off half-day classes at Perry School. George Marich, formerly principal at Madrona School for five years, will head the 21-member teaching staff at Jefferson.

Nearly all youngsters who make the move will be enrolled in the same class with the same teacher they started with in September. On the day before the move, youngsters will be transported to their new school by bus, bringing with them their books and individual supplies. All Jefferson children will be within walking distance of the school, which will serve the area bounded by Hawthorne, Sepulveda, Anza, and Torrance Blvd.

In addition to its 16 classrooms and two kindergarten rooms, the plant will include an administration building, shop and homemaking units, and a multipurpose building.

Dutchman Now Teaches English to El Camino College Students

Gam Snyders, as his anglicized names is listed on campus publications, first came to El Camino College in a teacher exchange which took instructor

John Hartley to Holland for one year in 1955.

Though they failed to meet while on exchange, the two are now co-workers in the English department.

Snyders speaks English "like a native." Hartley, who returned to the United States and the El Camino campus in the fall of 1956, and Snyders taught under the Fulbright exchange program for teachers.

In his native Holland, Snyders, who now calls the United States his home, was a high school principal in Alkmaar. He points out that in his native country, specialized teaching is emphasized. While in grade school in Holland, students determine which of six types of high schools they wish to attend. This is accomplished in accordance with their planned vocations.

Likes It
His affection for the campus at El Camino and the Southland led him to his wife, Dinah, to make overtures for a return to the United States.

Months of record evaluation, floods of letters and anxious moments followed. Finally, in time for the opening of the fall semester at the college, Dinah and Gam Snyders established their home near the campus.

Though he may have been in

Dutch long enough to utter an absent-minded "Gute morgen, mijsler" to an early morning English class, he is far from being Dutch in the vernacular sense of the word.
