Torrance Man To Give Piano Recital at SC

Dale Reubart, Torrance pianist, member of the faculty of the University of Southern California School of Music, will play a recital in Hancock auditorium on the SC campus at 8:30 p.m. on Dec. 2. The public is invited to this free program. Reubart will play Sonata in D Major, K. 576, by Mozart; Four Impromptus, Opus 90, by Schubert; Scherzo in E Flat Minor, Opus 4, by Brahms; Mirrors by Ravel, and Mephisto Waltz by Liszt.

A graduate of the University of Kansas City, Reubart came West in 1953 and earned the Master of Music degree at SC where he was a student of Lillian Steuber. He formerly was a pupil of Richard Canterbury and Carl Frieberg in Kansas City, and Harold Bauer in Miami.

Reubart was soloist with the Kansas City Philharmonic orchestra twice, and gave annual recitals in Kansas City and other cities of the Middle West. He has also appeared twice as soloist with the SC Symphony Orchestra and the Beach Cities Symphony.

He recently recorded several compositions by Chopin for a new recording company.

Reubart lives at 5419 Reese Rd. in Torrance with his wife, Betty, who is a graduate student in voice at SC, and their two children, Ricky, 6; and Adriane, 9.

Victor Annexation Could Mean Two New Schools

At least one or perhaps two new elementary schools will have to be constructed in the Victor Precinct if that section of the city joins the Torrance Unified School District.

S. E. Waldrip, assistant superintendent, said that while the Torrance Board of Education has not yet been officially notified of the move to switch from Redondo to Torrance, his office will start work on plans the minute the matter is made official.

He said that a rough estimate of student population in the Victor Precinct, based on subdivisions now under consideration, is approximately 1000.

This number, he said, could mean either one large, or two smaller schools that will have to be reconstructed.

Petitions from residents of the area, which became part of Torrance two years ago, but has remained in the Redondo Beach City Schools and South Bay Union High School districts, were turned in this week.

They have already been forwarded to the county counsel's office for checking.

If all the paper work sails through smoothly by Feb. 1, and the Board of Supervisors approves the switch, the area would become part of the Torrance Unified School District next September.

Transfer Students

Waldrip said that a new school could not be made available by that time, but said that the additional students would attend present Torrance schools. The elementary age youngsters would be bused and distributed among other schools.

G.I. Insurance Tips Given by VA Administrator

Many of the 3,200,000 World War II veterans who hold term GI life insurance may find themselves at "the point of no return" unless they plan their insurance futures now.

That's the word of caution sounded today by D. L. Peppers, acting manager of the Veterans Administration office in Los Angeles.

He identified the veterans as those who expect life-time protection from their term GI policies, ignoring the spiraling cost of term insurance as they grow older.

Term insurance affords maximum protection at minimum cost, during the years it is usually needed for a growing family. It is seldom suitable for protection in policyholder's advanced age, Peppers said.

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
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
