




HARBOR DRIVE-IN THEATER

Petitions Seek Control of Poisonous Castor Plants

Petitions to clamp restrictions on poisonous castor bean plants, were sent to the City Council this week.

Mrs. Vera Kiesler, of 3633 W. 180th Pl., said that she and Mrs. Virginia Caley, had obtained more than 200 signatures to ask the city to pass a control law.

The mothers took action after a boy who had eaten one of the castor beans died in Fontana, and a Torrance youngster had a close brush with death.

Health Department officials have described the beans as extremely dangerous if chewed.

The petitions asked the City Council for a law regulating and controlling the raising of the plants, even if they can not be outlawed altogether.

Mrs. Kiesler said that she had received signatures from parents all over the city, and said the petitions drive was launched for the protection of youngsters who might chew the beans.

She added that if necessary, she can readily obtain additional signatures.

'Clean Fuels' Sought by Hahn

A motion by Supervisor Kenneth Hahn urging the Air Pollution Control District to concentrate its research on the development of a 'clean' gasoline type fuel was referred by the Board of Supervisors this week to the Air Pollution Control District.

Supervisor Hahn's motion points out that Los Angeles County has had a serious air pollution problem since July, 1943.

The resolution was triggered by a subdivision, approved last week, which will be served by Dominguez, despite feelings on the City Council that the tract should be served by the municipal department.

Last week Isen suggested that any right that Dominguez has to serve the subdivision should be condemned before water mains are installed.

The city has carried on some negotiations in the past to purchase the private water companies which serve various parts of the city.
