While many fishermen are eagerly awaiting the opening of trout season, there are a few who enjoy opening day the year round. They have discovered Lake Isabella. A short 3 1/2 hour drive and their line is in the water ready for action. Although Isabella is primarily known for Bass and Crappie, the fisherman who has the patience and know-how can usually fill a stringer with firm, tasty trout from 10 to 15 inches in length.

There are many ways to fish this lake. We prefer the slow troll, trailing such lures as Super Dupers, Flatfish, Wobbling Spoons and Colorado Spinners. The still fishermen prefer worms, eggs and cheese as bait.

Boats and motors are available at moderate prices and motels and restaurants have been expanded to meet the growing demand of fishermen, campers and hunters.

The fastest and easiest route to Lake Isabella is to take U.S. Highway 6 through Palmdale, Lancaster and Mojave. Just past Red Rock Canyon you see a sign that says, "To Walker Pass and Lake Isabella."

Here's an interesting note—for the fortunate few, a new airport has just been opened on the shores of the lake, so if you've been bitten by the fishing bug and want the most pleasant cure for the fish disease, try Lake Isabella—we promise you'll more than enjoy it.

Date of the allstar football game was set for Saturday, July 18, at El Camino's Forrest Murdock Stadium.

Details of the forthcoming games were announced by Dr. Bernard Garen, who has been named president of the Optimist Football Association for the second year.

In selecting McLaughlin for Bay League coaching duties, it was reported that his Samohi assistant coach, Don Kramer, will assist in the tutoring of the allstars.

McLaughlin said that he was pleased with the opportunity to return as coach of the team, commenting, "Don Kramer and I certainly had a fine experience with the team last summer and are looking for an opportunity to reverse our 7-6 loss to the Pioneer Leaguers."

The head coach of Santa Monica High has been coaching for three years since completing a successful career as a center for UCLA and the Los Angeles Rams.
