Election Screening Approved

Despite a joking reference to a "criminal investigation," Councilmen approved an election qualification board which would be charged with screening candidates for municipal offices.

The board, to be composed of City Clerk A. H. Bartlett, City Attorney Stanley Remelmeier and Police Chief Percy Bennet, would determine residential and other qualifications of political job hunters.

The move is designed to prevent ineligible candidates from being listed on the ballot. This occurred during the last election when the name of Barney Miller, a candidate for city clerk, appeared on the ballot, although he withdrew from the race after it was alleged he had failed to comply with residential requirements.

Councilman George Bradford referred to the screening board, which will have no actual power, as "sounding like a criminal investigation."

5th High School Predicted

Since Torrance schools may house some additional 12,000 to 13,000 children within 10 years, a fifth high school may well loom on local horizons, the Board of Education was told Tuesday night, although there apparently will be no need for a sixth high school.

There appears to be enough bond money to purchase the site for a fifth high school if the board chooses to do so at an early date, officials said, though the final unit of South High School and the first unit of West High must be built within 10 years.

Further study of figures and sites will be needed before a definite recommendation will be made. Figures indicate that a high school enrollment of more than 12,000 is possible by 1969 or 1970, according to a study by the Department of Special Services.

In addition to some 9600 elementary children now attending schools here, (who will then be in high school), there are a possible 1300 more if present areas zoned for homes should be developed and a possible 1000 more if Wateria Lake and other areas now zoned for housing should be rezoned. The birth rate also will be a factor.

There appears to be an increase in plans for apartment houses in the city, the report noted, and these may mean more children in a smaller area.

School officials have been studying possible sites for a fifth high school in the south central part of town.
