American woman finally received a recognition long overdue recently with the publication of the first edition of "Who's Who of American Women."

Listed in the publication, proof of the increasing number of women achieving national importance, is local Harbor College social science instructor Dr. Ellen Zaehner Erchul.

Dr. Erchul falls into the second largest vocational category of women listed, college educators, who comprise seven per cent of the total. The largest group, 15 per cent, is made up of club, civic and religious leaders.

Dr. Erchul has been an instructor of sociology and history at Harbor College since 1957 and for the previous 13 years was a social case worker for the Los Angeles City Schools.

Her career has alternated between education and social work, and she is equally devoted to the two fields. She has done both types of work in the Middlewest, the South and Southern California and has served in administrative capacities in numerous professional organizations.

She is a graduate of the University of Southern California, where she received her Ph.D. degree in 1933.

Married to John J. Erchul, an engineering consultant, Dr. Erchul makes her permanent home in Los Angeles. However one of their favorite hobbies is traveling, and they are frequent visitors in other parts of the world.

The new biographical dictionary, listing 19,000 notable women, has been brought out by the publishers of "Who's Who in America" and is the first book of its kind in the United States.


