Mother's Visit Fun for Family With Southern Cooking a Must

A seven-day-a-week job with no retirement but lots of benefits. That is the way Mrs. Mary B. Duke feels about her lifetime career of being a mother.

Mrs. Duke, who raised her four daughters on a farm in Georgia, still delights in doing things for them and their children.

Now staying with her daughter, Mrs. Frank Thompson, 2008 Santa Fe Ave., she likes to help with her grandchildren but firmly states that their own mother's word comes first.

Everyday is an exciting adventure," says Mrs. Thompson, who believes "moulding a child's mind the most wonderful gift in the world."

Her tips on child rearing are few but to the point.

"Give them lots of love and discipline and speak in a low, positive tone of voice."

Her occasional visits to her daughters and their families are looked forward to eagerly. "I can't keep up with her, says Mrs. Thompson, "When she leaves to

visit my sister in Alaska we will miss her terribly."

On every visit, Mrs. Duke treats the family to some of her excellent Southern cooking, bringing back the days of the girl's childhood on their abundant farm.

The following favorites are her original recipes:

Roast Turkey

Salt the bird inside and out, and keep in the refrigerator covered with a wet cloth.

Remove the neck, liver, gizzard, first two joints of the wing, and the tail. Cook slowly in cold water in an open pan removing the liver after about 40 minutes.

Preheat the oven to 500 degrees. Place bird on a rack with

the legs tied down and a couple of whole apples and a small onion inside the cavity. Place in a roaster with a small amount of water and cover with foil, with an extra piece across the breast and over the joints of the drumstick. Cook 2 1/2 or 3 hours according to the type of bird.

Reduce temperature every 30 minutes at 50 degrees a time until 300 degrees is reached.

The bird can also be cooked in a brown paper bag. Cut two holes in the bottom of the bag the size of a quarter and an inch apart. Grease the inside with butter, place the turkey inside, and roll the ends snugly holding them down with clothes pins. Place in pan and pour enough water over the bag to get it thoroughly wet.

When cooked pull the sinews out of the legs. Dip slices of the cooked bird in a little broth from roasting pan. This makes the meat especially tasty and moist.

Another family favorite is the recipe following which makes an unusual party salad.

Glazed Stuffed Apples

Wash and core 2 1/2 dozen cooking apples such as Winesap, Washington, or Pippin.

Then make a syrup of 4 cups sugar, 3 cups water, pinch of salt. While waiting for syrup to boil, peel apples. Put several drops of red cake coloring in the syrup. Then place the apples in the syrup and let cook until the ybegin
