Pioneers, Indians, missionaries and missions have been big topics of discussion at Arlington Elementary School, 17800 Arlington Ave., recently, as well as lions, tigers and bears.

Early California history and re-living those bygone days have been topics of top interest among students in fourth grade classes of Mrs. Angeline Comorre and Mrs. Kay Rollins, while the second and third graders in Mrs. Joan Dowell's and Miss Jan Poore's rooms have been finding out about animals of the world.

Mrs. Rollins' class, studying the days of early California, built their own "El Rancho Arlington" to show what the early homes used to look like. They did much reading and studying to determine what their building should

look like. They also added a fountain and cart for an authentic touch. When it was completed, the children invited their parents to a fiesta, with a Spanish program.

A miniature of an old Spanish mission village was created in Comorre's room. The students divided into committees to study early California life and as they reported on their findings, they added sections to the village, complete with figures. They laid out the plans as part of their arithmetic lessons and built them as art activities.

In the room which Miss Poore's and Mrs. Dowell's classes share, the youngsters have created a great zoo, showing the animals that they have studied about. Each child had to make a report on one animal, telling where the animal lived, and other pertinent facts about him. On a large map of the world the youngsters pointed out geographical facts about the animal's homeland.
