DOROTHY WILKES  
Tips on Charm

Now is the time to prepare for the summer months ahead. For a new face, fashion, face and a new you, a little concentration on basic beauty tips can do the trick.

First impressions are very important and skin care can mean a great deal.

Soap and water cleansing is for everyone, for dry as well as oily skins, but knowing the proper skin type is very important.

Here are a few easy to follow instructions for the three different types of complexion, and an added tip on that very important beauty treatment, cream cleansing.

**Normal:**

You have no special problem. Wash your face morning and night with a mild bland soap and lukewarm water. Massage lather into skin in circular, upward-outward motion. Rinse three times, last with cool water, or until you can feel every last trace of soap is gone.

If you are a combination, oily around the nose and chin, dry on cheeks and forehead, first use washcloth steaming hot on nose and chin, and gently soap-massage to clean and open these pores. Now proceed as above.

**Very Oily**

You can test for oil by laying clean tissue on your nose. If it shows a greasy spot, your skin is very oily, if a slight smudge, only somewhat. Give your face a steam bath to open pores. Hold your head over a bowl of hot water. Make a tent holding a towel over your head. Keep running in more hot water, massage face and neck, always in upward, outward, circular motion. Repeat around nose and chin, but go lightly around eyes. Do this twice a day.

**Dry Skin:**

Your skin feels tight, is always flaking a little, looks dull and lifeless. This skin will wrinkle early if it isn't given help. Everyone over 25 take note, by the time you reach 40 your skin will lose 20 per cent of its oils. So, you wash your face with soap, too, for true cleansing, but only once a day. Either morning or night. Use a bland soap and lukewarm water, never hot or cold. Massage neck and face in circular, outward, upward motion, then rinse four or five times in clean lukewarm water. Be extra sure you get the last suspicion of soap out of your skin. Dry gently, but very thoroughly. This skin needs to make oil, water left on it does not help.

**Cream Cleansing:**

For year-around care, soap and water are not enough for your face. Any skin, even oily, needs the additional softening, lubricating and toning action of a cream massage. Apply cream generously with both hands. Make sure every pore is covered, especially around nostrils, mouth corners, underlip, and a d back of neck. Practice stroking with an upward-outward motion, gently so as not to stretch the skin. Circle in under eyes and out over lids very gently. This area, where wrinkles show first, needs constant soaking with lubricating cream. Let cleansing cream sink into your face a few seconds before removing.
