ing the full skirt and a tiara of seed pearls holding her shoulder-length veil.


Her bridal bouquet consisted of a single white orchid surrounded by stephanotis mounted on a white Bible. Her pearl necklace was a gift of the bridegroom.

A reception followed the wedding with Mrs. Duane Stevens, the bride's aunt, assisting with arrangements.


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
