Torrance 'Y' Wins Honors for Fund Drive

At the 77th annual meeting of 25 Southern California YMCA's last evening, the Torrance YMCA was awarded the first annual Campaign Chairman's Trophy in recognition of its successful 1959 fund drive.

YMCA President Warren H. Crowell presented the modernistic trophy to Albert Isen, Torrance YMCA's general campaign chairman, before more than 650 persons at the Ambassador Hotel.

In accepting the trophy, Isen shared honors with retiring Board Chairman Ben Smith. Smith was unable to attend because his son, Tim, graduated from Torrance High School the same evening.

The award is given to the YMCA which has the highest percentage of gain over the previous year's fund drive. The local YMCA has raised \$32,500 this year, a 35 per cent increase over last year's campaign.

Both Isen and Smith held their respective YMCA assignments during the 1958 drive, which they considered a "failure," although it represented the most successful campaign the "Y" had had to that time. They remained to lead this year's unprecedented drive to keep the YMCA in pace with community growth.

A total of 18 YMCA board members and wives were on hand to honor Smith and Isen. The trophy will be on display throughout the year.

Dog Vaccination Program Planned Next Thursday

No cases of rabies have been reported in Torrance for the past three years.

Communicable Disease Inspector V. W. Sweetman of the Torrance Health District office, credits the drop from almost epidemic proportions of the dread disease in 1953 and '54 to the compulsory vaccination program.

In line with the ordinance passed in October, 1955, the South Bay Humane Society announces a rabies clinic Thursday from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. at McMaster and El Retiro parks.

"What happened in '53 and '54 could happen again if the program isn't carried out" warns a Humane Society spokesman.

Fee for the clinic will be \$1.50, compared to private cost of from \$3.50 to \$5. All dogs must be on leash and must be brought to the clinic.

New dog licenses are due July 1. According to the law, owners of dogs not vaccinated will be subject to a misdemeanor charge involving up to \$500 fine and 60 days in jail.

Veterinarians will donate their time for the clinic.
