Redondo Boats Report Barge Fishing Good

Barge fishing was especially good in Redondo Thursday when Gordon McRae's three boats reported good catches of bonito, barracuda, small yellowtail, and halibut.

Rocky Point was also a good spot, as deep sea anglers loaded up on 296 halibut, possibly the largest catch of the year for Redondo fishermen.

Santa Monica Sportfishing Pier, enjoying its finest season in several years, reported its first full limit catch in some time Thursday, after hauling in 1043 fish, more than a thousand being big barracuda.

The next four night run of grunion is expected to hit Southern California beaches at approximately 10:15 p.m. today.

Hunters are reminded that fishing licenses are required of all persons 16 and older.

A five or six foot Blue shark which has been swimming around behind Santa Monica Sportfishing Pier the past three days was both harpooned and shot yesterday but was not killed, by area lifeguards. After the harpoon broke in the fish's back, a 45 was shot into the shark's head.

The shark, which had been feeding on fish near the pier's tackle stand, "was hurt bad enough where if it does live, it won't live long enough," our informant relates.

Swimming Classes at Pool Start

More than 900 youngsters already have signed up for "waterproofing" sessions conducted at Benstead Plunge by the Torrance Recreation Dept.

Al Pell, director of the plunge, said the summer-long program enrollment is expected to hit its capacity of 2,600.

The first group of children began splashing their way through the initial two-weeks long lesson series last week. Six such series are planned with the final one starting Aug. 24.

Lessons for adults will be offered at the pool at 5 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays starting this week. Registration for this program has reached 250.

Juniors and senior life saving classes are scheduled for 5 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays starting this week.

Since the program was started at the plunge in 1956, more than 7,000 children and 750 adults have taken swimming lessons. Of these, 3,550 children and 570 adults successfully passed tests at the conclusion of the instructional periods.

Summer Arts and Craft Program to Start June 22

An Arts and Crafts program for all ages will begin tomorrow at the Arts & Crafts Center, 1511 Cravens Ave., according to the Torrance Recreation Dept. Registration is open now.

The series will be previewed by an exhibit scheduled for 3 until 5 and 7 until 9 p.m. on June 19 at the Center.

The opening program will be Indian Lore crafts on June 22. Participants will study the jewelry, costumes and dances of the redmen. A class for youngsters from 6 to 9 years of age is set for 9 a.m. while one for children 9 through 12 years of age is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Four, two week classes are planned. There is a \$1.50 charge including the cost of materials.

Beginning June 23 there will be classes in puppetry and children's art.

Meeting Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays the puppetry classes will be conducted in two week sessions at 1 p.m. for 6 through 9 year olds and 3 p.m. for youngsters from 9 through 12 years of age. The fee is \$1.50 including the cost of all materials.

Three, three week children's art classes are planned for Tuesday and Thursdays at 9 a.m. for 6-9 year olds and at 10:30 for 9 through 12 year olds. The six lesson fee is \$5.

The ancient art of mosaics will be taught to adults at 7:30 p.m. Tuesdays starting June 23. There is a fee of \$2 for the eight week long class with the cost of materials extra.

An Omnibus workshop for adults will begin June 25 at 7:30 p.m. Students may take their choice of various crafts such as copper enameling, leather working, silk screening, etc. The workshop fee is \$2 for 8 sessions or 50c a session plus materials.

Various crafts will be taught to teen-agers during 7 p.m. classes that start Thursday, July 9. Fee is \$1.50 for 6 lessons or 50c a lesson including materials.

Registration for any of the classes is possible by phoning the Center, Fairfax 8-9624.
