More than \$169,000 in Street Project Contracts Awarded

Street improvement contracts, with a total value of \$169,285, were awarded in the 15th district during the first six months of the year, it was revealed today in the semi-annual report released by Councilman John S. Gibson.

Of the 23 construction projects, 15 were assessment act proceedings, where costs are chargeable

to adjacent property owners, costing \$109,512. Eight jobs paid for from public funds, totaled \$59,773.

Portions of five streets and nine alleys were paved in the list of assessment projects and one sanitary sewer line was constructed. Public fund expenditures included major street improvements, land acquisition, traffic signals and tree trimming.

While a total of 19 assessment act jobs were disposed of during the first six months, 21 new petitions were filed, increasing the total in process to 62, as against 60 at the start of the year.

Average time for a petition, from filing to contract was 20 months, the councilman said, keeping the 15th district well ahead of the average council district in speed of handling.

Councilman Gibson predicted that at least 20 more such jobs



Riviera Students Experts on South American Revolutions

How much does the average person know about yellow fever, Bolivian tin, Argentine beef, or the status of Latin American revolutions?

Students in Mrs. Irma Wilson's and Robert Heald's seventh grade summer classes at Riviera Elementary School are fast becoming experts on these subjects, since all are members of the Pan-American Congress.

The youngsters meet for 45 minutes daily, both in committees and as committees of the whole, to consider the problems which face the Americas. They model their actions after those of the regular Pan-American Congresses.

After solving the problems of the American, students break up into groups to consider subjects which are closer to home—reading, writing, arithmetic, science, music, art, and others. Instruction in all of these courses has a Pan-American theme, however.

This novel approach is being closely studied by school officials. It is similar in many respects to Model U. S. Congresses which have been held during the regular school year in Mrs. Wilson's rooms. Last year, the class appeared on television, demonstrating what they had learned. They modeled their actions on those of the real senators and congressmen.

In the Pan-American Congress, the summer scholars are studying and considering the same subjects as delegates from the 21 American nations. The youngsters represent different countries and take viewpoints from their country.


Several major projects, including a major street job and storm drain should boost the total to over \$1,000,000 the councilman said.
