 The Edison Co. will receive my check for juice used to view both All-Star games via the video route.


Thousands of fans are expected in the steel city for this affair. They will be treated to a player-selected pick of star athletes who will perform in what should be billed as an exhibition game.

The second place machine was a Plymouth Belvedere entered by DeVon Motors of Torrance, and was sponsored by the California Highway Patrol.

Two other Torrance cars sponsored by the Associated Car Clubs under auspices of the police department, placed sixth and eighth, respectively in the low-medium division.

The sixth place car was a Ford Galaxie sponsored by Vel's Ford, while the eighth place car was a Rambler Ambassador entered by Dwight Eubank Rambler.

They showed a gas mileage of 18,106, and 17,964, respectively. The DeVon Plymouth recorded a mileage of 21,024.

Torrance Officer A. L. Jackson, who coordinated the local entries and served as an official in the run to Yosemite, was presented with a plaque for outstanding interest in the event.

It was the first time in the six year history of the event that it started and finished in Torrance.
