Bids Called for Additions at Five Elementary Schools

Bids for 20 classrooms additions at five Torrance elementary schools will be sought, with contracts to be awarded on July 31, the Torrance Board of Education decided Tuesday night.

Four classrooms each will be built at Anza, Arlington, Lincoln, Newton, and Sepulveda Schools, to house the growing student population there. Final plans prepared by Architect Roy Donley have been approved by the state.

At the same time, the board approved a resolution seeking allocation for funds for 10 elementary school additions and the first units of the new Victor School. These steps are necessary before the work can begin on the schools.

Additions would be built at Anza, Carr, Flavian, Meadow Park, Crenshaw, Magruder, Adams, Perry, Riviera, and Jefferson Schools and at the school district offices. Estimated cost of the work would be \$1,960,000.

The board was informed that square foot costs are rising generally and that the state has increased its allowances for school construction by about five per cent. Square foot costs, however, are generally rising.

Gibson Reelected President of Council for Fourth Term

Councilman John S. Gibson, who has represented the 15th district for the past eight years, was re-elected to his fourth term as council president Thursday.

Gibson has been president since 1953. His election to a fourth term as president ties the longest tenure in this office.

Besides equalling the longevity record, Gibson got a new mark for longest consecutive term.

Elected to council in 1951, Gibson assumed the presidency two years later as a compromise candidate.

With one seat vacant because of a death, the council was deadlocked seven to seven between Harold Henry, who had held the post for six years, and Ernest Debs, now a county supervisor.

Gibson was nominated in a surprise move and was elected when Debs pledged his support and votes.

Two new councilmen took office for the first time this morning. C. Lemoine Blanchard, who defeated Earle Baker, became 2nd district councilman.

James Harvey Brown, who was elected in the 18th district, and who was appointed in May to serve out the unexpired term of Ernest Debs, started his own term.

Missing Link Freeway Funds Request Hearing Set July 23

An all-out push to complete the missing link of the Harbor Freeway will be made in Sacramento July 23 by a delegation of Harbor area representatives.

The group will ask the State Highway Commission to give top priority to the allocation of funds in the 1960-61 budget to construct the freeway between 190th St. and Pacific Coast Highway.

Kyle Piercy, secretary of the Harbor District Chamber of Commerce, said that every effort will be made to convince the commission of the importance of the freeway.

Heavy Load

He pointed out that the Harbor Freeway now carries as much traffic as the Hollywood Freeway, 192,000 cars every 24 hours, and is the busiest in the County.

Construction of the Harbor Freeway between 124th and 190th Sts. is now in progress and this section is expected to be open to traffic in July or August of 1960.

Another section of the freeway, between Pacific Coast Highway south to San Pedro was completed several years ago, leaving only the segment between 190th St. and Pacific Coast Highway to be constructed.
