Danger of Poisoning in Home Canning Revealed

Botulism is a form of food poisoning that is fatal in about two-thirds of the cases that occur, and it can so easily happen to anyone who does not remain alert to its dangers.
A couple of weeks ago, a short time after tasting home canned mushrooms given to her by a friend, the wife of a local doctor became ill and was taken to the Los Angeles General Hospital where the diagnosis of botulism has since been made. This patient is not yet out of danger.

is still paralyzed, and is still in a respirator.
In-so-far as is known, three other jars of this same batch of mushrooms were consumed without ill effects at a Christmas party attended by the patient, but for some reason the botulism spores, capable of producing a toxin so deadly that one ounce of it could probably kill millions of people, were not completely destroyed in the gift jar during the canning process.
The organisms that produce the toxin (bacilli of the group Clostridium botulinum) are perfectly harmless when in the presence of air. Indeed, since these bacteria live in the soil they are frequently found on vegetables and fruit that have been in contact with the earth, and such food may be eaten raw or freshly cooked without any ill effects, whatsoever. When confined to the airless space of a can or jar, however, spores of these organisms may germinate and in so doing produce the deadly poison.

The bacteria will not usually grow in acid foods which include most of the fruits, tomatoes, pickles and fermented foods. If the acid of these foods is changed by mold growth, however, the germs may be able to grow and liberate the toxin. Therefore any canned food that shows signs of mold should not be used.
A pressure cooker, which processes food at a much higher degree of heat than other methods of preservation, should always be used in the canning of non-acid foods. The gauge must be tested and canning directions followed to the letter. One slip in the proper technique of the canning procedure may result in the growth of botulinus organisms.
When low acid foods are canned without a pressure cooker or without testing the gauge or thermometer, such food should be boiled 15 to 30 minutes before tasting. Although this short-time boiling does not destroy the spores, it does destroy any preformed toxin and renders the food safe to eat. Home canned string beans should always be boiled at least 15 minutes before tasting no matter how they are canned, and the same rule applies to mushrooms.

Seek Fast Work on Storm Drain Design Plans

Although most councilmen said they now agree that the contract for design of four major flood control projects is going to the right firm, they want to make sure that the plans are prepared as speedily as possible.
Wade E. Peebles, who recommended that the \$250,000 contract be awarded to Koebig and Koebig of Los Angeles, said the contract will be submitted to the City Council Tuesday.
Councilman Robert Jahn suggested that a penalty clause be included in the contract to assure early completion of the plans.
The flood control projects include a 35-acre sump to drain the Walteria Lake area.
