Welfare Building Site Bid in Civic Center Studied

Request for a welfare building site in the civic center was referred to City Manager George Stevens until a controversial civic center promotion committee is activated.

Use of the land was asked by Glenn Koger, Harbor Area chairman of the Welfare Federation who said the structure will be an asset to Torrance.

His organization asked for 22,500 square feet in the center on which to construct the building at its cost.

Despite Koger's assertion that such a development will make Torrance the hub of welfare activities, councilmen were not overly enthusiastic.

"I'm searching my mind how it will be an asset," said Councilman Willys Blount.

Stevens was finally instructed to turn the request over to a 15-member citizens group which is to be appointed to plan the future of the civic center, including recommendations for a new civic auditorium to replace the downtown one which has been sold.

The rules for appointing members of the committee were opposed by Mayor Albert Isen last week, who described them as "cumbersome."

In the meantime Councilman Nickolas O. Drane, nominated two members to the committee. They are Mrs. Margaret Clark, president of the North Torrance Civic Improvement Association, and John Kesson, former president of that group.

The action was brought by City Attorney Stanley Remelmeier in compliance with demands by Councilman Willys Blount who had demanded prompt action by the city.

The misdemeanor complaint is directed at Francis E. Foley, owner of the property at Madrona Ave. and Spencer St., across the street from the city dump.

He is accused of permitting grading and quarrying earth without a permit, allowing excavations without fences or barricades, allowing dumping of rubbish and permitting sewage to flow into the excavation.

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
Chest Campaign Office Opened

Torrance Firemen Study Fire Science Course at HC

The fire science curriculum at Harbor College, developed and taught by working firemen, has now gained national recognition, according to Captains Lawrence W. Erven and Eugene Mahoney of the Wilmington and Terminal Island Fire Stations.

Early in 1955 the two officers decided that it would be much more valuable and more interesting if firemen could study in groups under competent instructors rather than alone and unaided.

They therefore developed a plan for courses in fire science and

took it to higher department officials and to Harbor College educators.

Their aim was to develop a practical, comprehensive curriculum which would meet the needs not only of firemen, but of career-minded young men, and of men in industry who are concerned with fire hazards and problems. As a result, the Harbor fire science curriculum was established and rapidly became one of the fastest growing in the college. It now has 14 separate courses, enrolled in by men from fire fighting units throughout the southland.

The curriculum includes subjects ranging from Laws, Codes, and Ordinances, to Fire Fighting and Rescue Practices. It presents laboratory demonstrations of hazardous materials. It teaches maintenance and operation of all types of fire apparatus. It has been expanded to include subjects like speed reading and industrial supervision.

Approximately 1200 students have enrolled in the program since its inception four years ago. Information about enrollment for the fall semester may be obtained by calling the college, or by writing for the general catalog and schedule of classes.
