Registration for Schools Begins, Expect 25,000

With the re-opening of Torrance schools rapidly approaching, registration of new high school students at North, South and Torrance High Schools is scheduled to start Monday and continued through Sept. 2. Hours will be from 1 to 3 p.m. daily. Torrance schools will start again on Thursday, Sept. 10, with some 5000 high school and 20,000 elementary students expected. New students will report to the counselling offices of the high schools. Torrance High, 2200 West Carson St.; South High, 4801 Pacific Coast Hwy.; and North High, 3620 W. 182nd St. Students who attended elementary or high schools in Torrance last year do not need to re-register since their enrollment was completed in June. Parents of new students are asked to accompany their children to school to help pick the student's program. They should bring any records from former schools. High school attendance bound-

aries are as follows: North High—All area north of 190th St. in Torrance and all of the area bounded by 190th, Hawthorne, Del Amo Blvd., and the Redondo boundary (Southwest Park). Torrance High—All students in the Fern-Greenwood, Madrona, Torrance Elementary, and Wood attendance areas. Also all students in the area bounded by Del Amo, Hawthorne, Torrance Blvd., and the Redondo boundary (Victor Tract). South High—All students in the Hillside, Meadow Park and WALTERIA attendance areas, plus those who live west of Hawthorne and south of Torrance Blvd. Parents who need help in determining which school their children should attend may call the Special Services Department of the district at FAirfax 8-8080. Orientation for incoming freshmen will be held at all three schools on Wednesday, Sept. 9. Schedules will be announced later.

Concert, Vesper Service to Be Farewell to Auditorium

Torrance will bid adieu to its Civic Auditorium with a concert and vesper service Sunday evening. The Civic Symphony Orchestra, led by Miss Elyse Aehle, will present a program of light music starting at 7:30 p.m. This will follow a half-hour vesper service by members of the Torrance Ministerial Assn. Eugene Minor of Torrance, an 18-year-old recent graduate of Narbonne High School and protégé of Miss Aehle, will serve as guest conductor and lead the instrumental group in Britten's "Matinee Musicale." Soloists will include Ronnie Romm, 12-year-old trumpeter, who'll play "La Virgin de la Macerine," and Michael Malosek,

cellist formerly with the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra in New York, who'll be featured in Poppo's "Hungarian Rhapsody." Selections by the orchestra will include Cherubini's "Anakreon Overture," Von Suppe's "Pique Dame," Grofe's "Mardi Gras" and Khachatourian's "Masquerade Suite."

Young Minor has been with the orchestra for the past three years and plays second clarinet. Last year, he organized a symphony orchestra composed of young friends who are interested in music. The auditorium at El Prado and Cravens Ave., built by the Public Works Administration in 1936, has been sold by the city to the Security First-National Bank of Los Angeles. The bank, which reportedly plans to raze the concrete structure, will take it over Tuesday. Admission to the program is free. It is sponsored by the Torrance Recreation Dept.
