Dr. Louis Kaplan Given School District Post

Dr. Louis Kaplan, 3407 S. Cochran Ave. will become assistant superintendent of the Torrance Unified School District Sept. 1 following seven years as director of the aviation safety division at the University of Southern California.

His new duties will involve responsibility for special services and research in the Torrance public schools.

Dr. Kaplan is a graduate of Wayne State University, Columbia University and SC. He is the author of three books and has written many articles and research reports for education journals. Before coming to SC he was head of the department of education and psychology at the Oregon College of Education, Monmouth, Oregon.

Starting with 59 students in 1952, the flight safety program at SC increased its enrollment to 529 students this year under Dr. Kaplan's leadership.

More than 2000 pilots of the Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps and Army have been trained in the program with flying officers from foreign countries and civilians.


