Special Education Chosen As PTA Council Subject

"Learn Today About Our Special Education" was the theme of Torrance Council PTA's first open meeting of the year held Wednesday, at the YWCA with Mrs. William Poser presiding.

The inspirational was given in song by Mrs. Cecil Davey. Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of Schools, introduced Dr. Louis Kaplan, new assistant superintendent.

Mrs. N. S. Goodrich, Special Education Chairman, presented Charles Mahan, psychologist, special service department, Torrance school district, Lester Foster, principal, Columbia school and Mrs. Paul Snyder, PTA president, Columbia school.

Mahan told of the availability of classes for the handicapped child in the Torrance school district. Torrance Unified School District cooperates with Centinela Valley Union School District, Wiseburn Elementary, Inglewood Unified, Lawndale Elementary, Lennox Elementary and Hawthorne Elementary districts to form the Southwest School District Cooperative Special Education Program. Classes for the various type handicaps are held throughout these districts.

Foster explained the functions of the Columbia School for the severely mentally handicapped children. The children are taught to accept and be accepted in their homes and communities. They are taught fundamental skills by capable understanding teachers.

Mrs. Snyder presented the parents viewpoint on the education of exceptional children. She expressed the gratitude of parents for a school district that provides such educational facilities.

While the State permits education of this nature, all school districts do not have such facilities.

Tou Stavrou Festivities Slated by St. Katherine

The great holy day, Tou Stavrou, commemorating the elevation of the Holy Cross will be celebrated by St. Katherine, South Bay Greek Orthodox Church next Sunday, at Royal Palms Park, San Pedro.

His Grace, Bishop Demetrios of Olympus, head of the Western States Greek Orthodox Churches, will conduct the outdoor services scheduled to start at 11 a.m. Assisting His Grace will be Father Naoum Nitsiotis, pastor of St. Katherines, and visiting clergy from surrounding areas.

Joint Jehovah's Assembly Is Announced

"Announcing the Rulership of God's Kingdom" is the theme chosen for a joint assembly of 23 congregations of Jehovah's Witnesses scheduled for the first week-end in October, announces Rev. Garold Dunham of the Torrance church, 2303 Arlington.

The occasion marks the joint semi-annual meeting of California Circuit No. 16, at the Municipal Auditorium, Long Beach.

The presiding minister stated that "statistics proved that over half the residents of the community are not regular church members, and the purpose of this three-day Assembly is to instruct local ministers in more effective ways of presenting Bible truths.

Dunham added "that since millions despair because of the urgency of our times and the ever increasing burdens imposed upon mankind by international arms races, the questions arises: 'When is God's Will to Be Done on Earth?' Therefore, Bruce Griffin, district supervisor appointed by the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society, will use the above question as his Sunday topic."

"In keeping with the theme 'Announcing the Rulership of God's Kingdom,' said Dunham, "local ministers will learn how to effectively present answers to such questions as: 'lasting peace, will it ever be realized, how, when, by whom?'"

The climax of the three-day assembly will be a free public lecture, "When Is God's Will to Be Done on Earth?" to be delivered at 3 p.m. Sunday, October 4, at the Long Beach Municipal Auditorium.
