It's A Wise Parent

A Common Sense Approach to Your Child

Dear Mrs. Coe, Does a mother always have to be a good sport? Our two sons (10 and 12) bring a gang of neighborhood boys to play ball in our yard every afternoon and almost all day on week-ends. They break the flowers, trample the lawn, scream the roof down, and take whatever food and drink they can grab. How do I stop it without getting nasty?

Mrs. L. E. Dear Mrs. L. E. Your children not only have the run of the house... they are running you into the ground! And it's not necessary! Call a family meeting, including Dad, and together with your sons make rules of behavior both for your boys and their friends. Have the boys print these rules on a large sign and fasten it to the back door. Suggest that the boys turn the "gang" into a club with banishment from the yard as punishment for disobedience of club rules. Remember, firmness is not meanness... it's a guiding hand for the frequent blindness (and deafness) of youth!

Dear Mrs. Coe, As Henry Ford once said about history, Psychology is due to mental and social troubles that were not made by the young people. They were made by us adults, even the ones who were swatted in our youth. The fever of juvenile delinquency is highest in filthy, over-crowded slums, where eight people live in one room, there are few or no playgrounds, and no teen-age recreation centers.

There are many ways to try to solve this problem. Maybe Philadelphia has the answer. There, the parents of teen-age offenders are held fully responsible... by law... and sent to jail if necessary. Remember the apple doesn't fall far from the tree... and children usually have the same standards as their parents.
