Youth Band-Artist Concert Series Will Feature Famous Mormon Choir

With the season ticket sale set to get underway next week, the Torrance Youth Band announced yesterday that the famous Mormon Tabernacle Choir will be one of the four featured attractions in its forthcoming annual Concert Series.

At the initial three concerts, the youth band will play during the first half of the programs and an internationally famous musician on the second half. The fourth concert will be played entirely by the youth band and will feature as soloists the four winners of the young music competition scholarships.

The four scholarships, composed of \$100 in cash, are given to winners of competitions held in voice, piano, strings, and wind instruments, by the Torrance Junior Woman's Club. The scholarship winners also perform on the Woman's Club's last official meeting of the year in April of 1960.

The Mormon Tabernacle Choir of Southern California is fast becoming one of the Southland's leading musical organizations. It has made several appearances at the Hollywood Bowl and Cinerama Premieres; and has also sung at the Redlands Bowl, San Diego's Fiesta Del Pacifico, International Post Masters Convention with Lauritz Melchior, on many radio and television broadcasts including the Diana Shore Show.

Concert Dates Given
All of the four concerts will be given in the Campus Theater, El Camino College. The first concert, scheduled for Dec. 4th, will feature the Los Angeles Brass Quintet with Les Remsen, trumpet soloist, and Dorothy Remsen, harpist. The Redondo Union High School Madrigal Choir, directed by Tom Wilson, will also appear. The second concert on Feb. 5th will have the Los Angeles Flute Club with June Lusk, piano soloist. A class of Torrance students is learning about France because their teacher learned about Torrance while she was in France.

Miss Sarina Genovese, new sixth and seventh grade teacher at Carr Elementary School, was attracted to Torrance this year by what she read about the "Little Red Schoolhouse" while teaching at Rochefort Army Base near Royan, France.

She and her sister lived in a French apartment house, with many other French families and got along very well.

Children Same World Over
Generally, children are much the same the world over, Miss Genovese feels. She had mostly American students, although there were a few French children who were stepchildren of servicemen. American youngsters generally were very helpful to their French counterparts.

First Hand-Knowledge
Miss Genovese's classes now are getting the benefit of what she learned in France. They are studying conversational French in class as well as getting first-hand information about the country for their social studies class.
