Third graders at Carr School are learning Spanish the natural way.

Classes of Aurora de Luzardo, Virginia, Woods, and Christine Peterson are able to carry on elementary conversations in Spanish, as the result of the teaching this year.

All teachers have good Spanish backgrounds, but Mrs. de Luzardo is a former resident of Colombia, where she was a teacher for the State Department. She is helping the group plan the program.

A few minutes a day is devoted to conversational Spanish.

Parents are enthusiastic about the program, according to a survey made by the principal. One parent said his child enjoyed talking with some Spanish-speaking neighbors for the first time.

To help interest the children, Mrs. de Luzardo started out with bulletin boards showing Peanuts comic-strip characters using Spanish phrases.

Two Garden Clubs Offer to Develop Arboles Park

Two Torrance garden clubs will develop a park for the Riviera section of the city if their proposal is approved by the Recreation and Park Commission at a hearing Nov. 18.

Mrs. Merrill Peavy, past president of the Riviera Garden Club, said her group and Las Colinas Garden Club will do much of the landscaping if the city approves their plans.

They are seeking aid of other organizations in buying plants for the development.

Los Arboles Park already has been planted with grass and a sprinkler system installed by the city. No more money has been available.

Now Richard P. Gawne, registered landscape architect, is donating his services on behalf of the park at request of Mrs. Peavy. At the meeting he will show the commission plans he has prepared to cover a five-acre development. The site is at Calle de Ricardo and Paseo de las Tortugas.

He proposes the park to be surrounded by trees, floral pots, and shrubs, embracing a spacious grassy area. Room will be left for a community building at the north edge of the park later.

If the city will install walkways designated in Gawne's plan, three score of garden-club women stand ready to attack the sword.


