City Delegates Inspect Flood-Control Progress

Good progress is being made on improvement of Dominguez channel to provide flood control for Torrance, Lawndale, Hawthorne, and adjacent communities, Supervisor Kenneth Hahn reported this week following an inspection tour.

The improvements have been under construction since August between Gramercy Pl. and Redondo Beach Blvd. in Torrance.

Hahn was accompanied by Mayor Albert Isen, J. H. Paget, and Fred W. Mill, president and past president of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, and Dick Fitzgerald, chamber secretary-manager.

Several years ago, after a serious flood in Torrance, Hahn inspected Dominguez channel with the chief engineer of the county Flood Control District. As a result, a five-year program was developed, the district under instructions to expedite construction.

The plan called for widening and deepening the channel from Vermont Ave. to 120th St. and Crenshaw Blvd. over a five-year period.

First unit of the project was completed in February, 1958, eight months ahead of schedule.

George Bradford and Willys Blount.

Bradford voiced positive misgivings that the city's paving of the street establishes a precedent that will open the door for every subdivider, past and future, to demand Torrance do likewise for them.

Mayor Isen held with the contrary, declaring that the family members are not at fault for being related and that they are acting as individuals in developing their property, even though the lots adjoin. He declared it is not a subdivision.

Drale indicated it was a dirty shame these people had been forced for so long to keep retaining while city officials abstained from granting them permission to develop their holdings, during which time subdivisions have surrounded them.

He pointed out that the petitioners had deeded the street to the city and had paid for curbs, gutters, and sidewalks. He was against holding off approval of their zone requests any longer.

Use classified Call FA 8-2345

This job placed the channel on a new alignment south of and parallel to Artesia-Blvd., eliminating several slough and ponding areas which impeded storm waters. It improved the canal from Vermont to Denker Ave.

Second unit, now undergoing final inspections, extended the improvements to Gramercy Pl.

This project included new bridges across the flood-control waterway at Western Ave., Artesia Blvd. and Gramercy Pl.

Work on the third unit, from Gramercy place to Redondo Beach Blvd., started last August and is a one-year construction project.

Plans are 65 per cent complete for the next unit, which will extend the improved channel north to Compton Blvd.

With about 50 per cent of the excavation work completed, excavation of the third section is being suspended until next spring

to avoid heavy rains. Work on another phase of the project will go ahead full speed during the winter and clear the way for operations on the channel bed in the spring.

This is construction of four bridges across the channel—at Redondo Beach Blvd., Cherry Ave., Crenshaw Blvd., and Arlington Ave.

The Cherry Ave. bridge is now 75 per cent complete, while the bridge on Crenshaw, just south of Redondo Beach Blvd., is 85 per cent complete. Work recently started on the Arlington Ave. bridge. Work has started on the detour on Redondo Beach Blvd.

At Hahn's request, all bridges across Dominguez channel are being constructed to full master-plan standards.

"This makes it possible to eliminate road hazards at the same time the flood-control channel is being improved and saves substantial sums of money," Hahn said.

New bridges across the channel also are important to the flood-control project because they eliminate one of the main sources of trouble during storms, he declared.

Existing bridges were built over narrow culverts, debris and rubbish jammed against the bridges during storms, causing water to overflow.

New bridges are built over huge concrete boxes, about 18 feet tall and 75 feet wide, allowing a free flow.

Each section of the channel is being widened to 75 feet on a 125-foot right-of-way. Sides and bottom are being lined with concrete, reinforced with steel.

The channel carries flood waters to the ocean near San Pedro. Several similar improvement projects are planned near the channel's outlet.
