Torrance to File Injunction on Water District

Torrance Tuesday night authorized filing an injunction against the county to prevent formation of a water district that would include any of Lomita's Narbonne No. 2 lying in this city.

The City Council, on motion of Nick Draie, followed the thinking of City Attorney Stanley Remelmeier. The latter told the council that management of the water company opposed severance, which would mean Torrance taking over that part of the service now within its boundaries.

The remainder of the company would be just as expensive to operate, the company said, and therefore it would be forced to demand the maximum in severance damages, making the transaction a loss to Torrance.

If residents vote to accept the county district, then that entity could buy the part situated in Lomita. If the district fails to carry, water users could be served by Torrance.

Councilman Robert B. Jahn interjected a note for the record, without dissent from the remainder of the council: that Torrance would be pleased to provide water to the residents of Lomita at a reasonable rate. Torrance is not proposing to use condemnation to get Lomita citizens into a district they do not wish, and this city is not undertaking to annex Lomita by supplying its utilities. An annexation, he noted, is entirely separate from these present considerations.

Councilman J. A. Beasley insisted on ensuring the cheapest possible supply of water to Torrance residents of the district.

PROTECTING THE STATUE OF LIBERTY
