Pioneer League leader El Segundo comes to town tomorrow night favored by a touchdown to beat the Spartans in the final game for both teams to be held at North High Stadium.

Last week the vaunted Eagles were held to a 6-6 tie by Torrance High as their highly publicized passer, quarterback Beatheard, failed miserably, completing just one of fourteen passes. However, the El Segundo eleven, showed that they had a magnificent defense even though the Tartars managed to tie-up their offense.

The Spartans last week suffered their first Pioneer League defeat when they ran into a fast-climbing Aviation eleven. South's ground and air game was stymied through-out the game with pass interceptions and a short punt being turned into touchdowns by an alert Falcon team. Aviation also managed to halt the fine running of Bob Wehrhan and Joe Austin along with intercepting or batting down Hargrove and Duffy passes.

This week in practice South coach Dave Tollefson concentrated on sharpening his pass defense as well as pass offense. South must win this one if they hope to take league honors. In the event they do El Segundo would be eliminated as their record would show 4-1-1 whereas South's would read 5-1-0. Aviation, with a 4-1-0 chart at present, could tie for the lead if they won their final game. Whatever the outcome Saturday night at Torrance High Stadium, one thing's for sure — this game will be a thriller. If you have not purchased your tickets, hurry, a sell-out has been predicted.
