Loneliest Children of All

Blind, emotionally disturbed children, are the loneliest of all. It is difficult to imagine a more pitiful figure than a small child who is not only blind but whose early experiences have been so cruel that the tot's mind rebels unconsciously. These emotionally disturbed boys and girls, whom psychologists refer to as autistic, unconsciously disassociate themselves from the world around them.

They are unable to relate themselves either to people or to things around them. Their language is gibberish.

The Braille Institute, using money from individuals bequeathed in wills, this past year has provided clinical treatment for 13 of these children. As a result of this help, some of these youngsters are enrolled in public school. Others are making such progress that it can be expected that they, too, will go to school and become adjusted to their visual handicap.

There could be no finer expression of Christmas spirit than making a contribution to the Braille Institute at 714 North Vermont Avenue, Los Angeles, to carry on this work and make it possible to come to the rescue of even more of these children.

Narbonne Water

EDITOR THE PRESS:

I have been reading with interest the letters and comments of the local press concerning the proposed annexation to County Water District 13 of that area in Lomita and parts of Torrance now being served by Narbonne No. 2.

According to reports, the outmoded and dilapidated water system has served the area for nearly half a century, and its ancient and rusty pipelines laid in the ground so long ago are no longer able to supply the residents with adequate water and could bear no further strain if the water pressure were increased.

In order for the system to be brought up to par so sufficient pressure could be restored and enough water made available to meet the increased demands, the

entire system would have to be replaced. New pipe lines and mains would have to be laid. The residents would have to purchase new water meters. All of this, not counting meters, it has been estimated, will cost in excess of a half-million dollars.

In order to defray the cost of replacing the system (exclusive of the charge for the new meters), in the event the area should be annexed to the county water district, it has been recommended that a bond issue be floated. Of course, if a bond issue were to be floated, our tax bills again would be raised, as it is the public who must ever stand the cost of any county expenditures.

Now, since I am a resident of the area already served by District 13 and since I already pay a substantial fee for water and did pay a substantial sum for the meter which enables me to receive the service, I do not feel that I and the other subscribers to No. 13 should be burdened with any further expense, higher tax bills, higher fees, less pressure (because of a wider range of distribution) and a proportionate share of a large bond issue!

Navy Has Jobs for Discharged Sub Personnel

The Navy recruiting office today announced billets are open in submarine duty for discharged personnel of the regular navy and naval reserve with a minimum of two years of active duty, providing they re-enlist within three years from discharge.

Former submarine personnel can re-enlist at the same rate held at time of discharge under certain ratings. These ratings are posted at the navy recruiting office and may be obtained by calling DA -4588.

Requirements are as follows:
1. Honorably discharged from U. S. Navy or U. S. Naval Reserve with a minimum of two years of active duty.
2. Must be able to pass physical examination.
3. Must not be over 39 years old.


