

# OUTDOORS WITH MEL

After writing an article a few weeks ago about finding out of the way places to fish with the possibility of more and larger fish, the reward I had several phone calls. One was from Jack Peterson of Lomita. He came in to my store and we plotted out a trip which I thought might provide good fishing. He had a 14 foot boat with a 35 horsepower motor. I suggested that he put in his boat at Paradise Cove and travel up the coast after picking up live bait if possible. I told him that there is a great deal of Kelp in that area which is hardly ever fished and it certainly looked like a sure bet for out of the way type fishing. I sold him a few jigs like the Hula Poala, small Spooner, and feather jigs which I felt would also catch fish and sent him on his way.

A few days later he came in and thanked me. He followed my instructions to avoid areas that were being fished by the other boats and traveled about 10 miles up the coast to the Kelp beds. He caught Calico bass, up to 5 pounds and he said they would really hit jigs as well as bait. He got one small white sea bass, and a few small halibut but he was amazed that the fishing was so good and he never saw another boat anywhere near the area he fished. This is just another example of the fishing that's available if only you'll look for it.

Hunting is rated fair to poor in most of the Southern California area with a few spots providing the most action. Quail hunting is spotty throughout the Southern California area with the bright spot being along the Palo Verde Area south Blyth. You hunt along the river, and can combine Quail, Cottontail Rabbits, and Catfish all in one trip. Chukar are scarce with the best bet being Red Mountain, and the Handburg Mountain Area east of Mohave, and the area around Lucerne Valley. The birds are high up and scattered. Duck hunters are still rain dancing in hopes of enough bad weather to drive the birds down from up north, and to drive the existing birds low enough for a few good shots. The average game bag at the Salton Sea shows about 1 1/2 ducks and about one-third geese. The 1/2 duck and one-third duck are really hard to shoot.

## Coliseum Will Prove Costly to Dodgers for '60 Season

The Coliseum Commission will receive at least \$900,000 in rent from the Dodgers for the use of the Coliseum during next year's baseball season and this will produce a net return of about \$600,000 to the Coliseum Commission, after allowing the Dodgers credit for certain expenditures they have made but which the Commission has met for other tenants, Supervisor Kenneth Hahn announced today.

In approving the Dodgers' contract for 1960, the Commission agreed to let the baseball club use the Coliseum under the same terms, conditions and rentals paid by the Los Angeles Rams, UCLA, USC and other tenants.

The new contract calls for the Dodgers to pay the Commission 10 percent of all gate receipts and to relinquish all concession revenue to the Commission.

Supervisor Hahn, who was instrumental in bringing the Dodgers to Los Angeles, said that they should be treated the same as any other tenants.

"Mr. O'Malley has done very well during the past two seasons in the Coliseum. He should pay the same as all other tenants," he added.

The Coliseum Commission agreed that it would give the Dodgers credit for their expenditures on maintaining the grounds and playing field, sweeping, rubbish removal, lamp replacement, and removing, installing and storing the fences, and similar expenditures. The Commission pays these costs for other tenants.

"I realize that the Dodgers will be paying more for rental of the Coliseum next year than for the entire payroll of all of the players, but I believe that the standard rental is fair," Supervisor Hahn said.

Coliseum Manager William Nicholas told Supervisor Hahn he estimated the Dodgers made at least \$6,000,000 playing in the Coliseum the past two years.

Supervisor Hahn gave credit to Los Angeles County Counsel Harold W. Kennedy for laying the legal groundwork for the new contract under which the Dodgers will pay the standard 10 percent rental figure. Kennedy's legal opinion on the proposed contract held that the Dodgers are obligated to meet the terms of the contract as originally negotiated, which called for the Dodgers to pay the 10 percent fee if they used the Coliseum more than two years.

## Santa Maria Hosts ECC

Still in search of their first road victory, El Camino's cagers journey to Santa Maria Friday night to tackle Hancock Junior College, rated one of the biggest and best hoop teams in the state.

Last year Hancock produced John Rudometkin, currently operating on the starting five at USC, and this year the Santa Maria quintet is looked upon as another powerhouse.

Coach George Stanich's five proved it could handle the big boys even though lacking in height. Over the week-end the Indians pressed and scared undefeated Glendale before bowing 79-78, then bounced back on the home court to take the measure to tough Riverside City College, 66-59.

Jack Runyon, 5'11" Camino College cage guard, proved there's just as

much room in basketball for a good little man as there is for a big fellow as he tallied 27 markers against Glendale on Friday and picked up 20 points in the Riverside fray Saturday evening.

Taking on the Glendale Vaqueros on their home court, El Camino failed to get off to a rousing start; not so the GCC crew, which managed to hit for over 51 percent of its shots.

Ron Saltmarsh, a forward whom Coach Abe Androff switched to guard for the ECC game, contributed the first eight points toward the Vaqueros cause as he set the GCC hoopsters off to a red hot 45-40 half-time lead. All totaled, Saltmarsh hit for 13 points in the initial 20 minutes.

While Saltmarsh was propelling Glendale sky high, El Camino managed to stay within hailing distance on the strength of free throws. Tribe netters converted 12 charity tosses into points, with Harry Dinnel accounting for 10 of the direct hits, while falling behind the Vaquero's 18-14 in the field goal department.

With Runyon paving the way, the Tribe obliterated the early Glendale lead in the first five minutes of the second half, knotting the count at 54-54.

Taking nips and tucks to the wire, Glendale busted open a 74-74 deadlock with 1:09 remaining in the game, when Tim Vezie, a prep star of Glendale High's CIF winners last season, put the Vaqueros in the lead 76-74 with his twenty-first point of the evening.

Substitute Don Hinds stretched Glendale's lead to 77-74 with 53 seconds to go on a free throw. Dinnel moved the upset-minded Warriors to within one point of Glendale with two charity shot conversions, but Milt Rowe put the game on ice with the crapper with nine seconds left. Bob Harlick brought ECC's total to 78 when he hit a lay-up one second before the gun, but the Vaqueros held on to win, keeping their winning streak intact at four in a row.

Runyon was high point man for the night, burning the nets for 27 points on 10 field goals and seven free throws; Vezie of Glendale followed with 21, and Dinnel, leading rebounder in the game, was next with 20 tallies on four shots from the floor and 12 from the line.

With revenge in mind, ECC jumped to an early lead Saturday and never let the taller Riverside team catch up as it posted its third win of the season against two losses.

Playing a slower game than the Friday encounter, the Tribe suffered from sloppy passes and lackluster lapses, however, the erratic Riverside five couldn't take advantage of the El Camino mistakes.

Coach George Stanich started George Plante at center Saturday night and moved Dinnel back to his old forward position in a move to combat the Tribe's main headache, lack of height.

Plante responded with a masterful performance, potting 12 digits while doing yeoman work on the backboards. Dinnel proved equally at home at his forward berth, registering 16 markers along with cleanly blocking six Riverside shots and controlling the rebounding.

Stanich will stick with Plante at the post position as long as he continues to sparkle.

Runyon again walked off with scoring laurels, tallying nine in the first half and 11 in the second half to finish up the tilt with a 20-point output.

Frank Dixon was the top point producer for the Tigers as he wished the cords for six field goals and six free throws for a total of 18 points.
