## Torrance City Employees' Group Insurance Fuss Still Rages as Councilmen Charge Official Instructions Were Ignored

The City Hall fuss over who will provide group insurance for Torrance employees flared again Tuesday when Councilman Robert B. Jahn assailed the manner in which employees are being polled by their unions. Jahn said the notice of the meeting, at which workers were to decide between Pacific Mutual and Blue Cross last Friday, looked like just another union meeting.

He contended Pacific Mutual was not even mentioned, but that the choice had boiled to Blue Cross and Permanente. (Last week, over objections of the city's hired insurance consultant, the employees held out for Blue Cross. The council instructed the group to choose between Pacific Mutual and Blue Cross.)

Jahn further charged the employees were not told Blue Cross would cost them more. The council tentatively had agreed to a flat figure as the city's share, the workers to pay any balance.

Dick DeArmitt, president of the Torrance Fire Fighters and spokesman for the employees, said Pacific Mutual declined to send a representative to explain its policy to the meeting. Mayor Isen said he understood PM had but a day's notice and observed it would be an actuarial miracle to come up with a program in that length of time.

The council was upset that its instructions had been ignored and that a new company had been permitted to submit a proposal.

Councilman J. B. Beasley, an insurance broker, noted that it takes some 40 years to become an insurance expert and marveled that Torrance could produce so many from the ranks over night.

Jahn suggested a secret ballot conducted by the city might be in order. DeArmitt and Officer Charles Otis, speaking for police-department employees, said that would suit them just fine.

## Build Freeway to 174th St., Hahn Advocates

Construction of the San Diego freeway between Jefferson Blvd. and Artesia Blvd. (174th St.) is the ultimate solution to the traffic problem in the vicinity of the Los Angeles International Airport and adjacent areas including Torrance and other South Bay cities, Supervisor Kenneth Hahn declared today.

He pointed out that substantial progress has been made in improving county roads in the second supervisory district in the area of the International Airport during the past three years, but "that the gains which have been made have been offset by the continuing growth of population, business and industry in the community."

Hahn recalled that six years ago when his district was expanded to include the International Airport, Inglewood, Lennox, Hawthorne, Lawndale, and adjacent areas, he learned there had not been any advance planning to wipe out the traffic congestion that was even then beginning to strangle peak hour traffic.

He then instituted a two-pronged road improvement program including immediate steps which could be taken as well as long range planning to widen major and secondary highways to master-plan standards.


