

Chemist to Visit El Camino, Boost College Program

Dr. Harold Wilcox will visit El Camino College chemistry department March 9-11. He is sponsored by the division of chemical education of the American Chemical Society.

Purposes of the visit are to strengthen and stimulate the chemistry programs in colleges, provide the staff and majors in chemistry an opportunity of contacts with chemists and motivate college students for careers in chemistry and teaching.

Dr. Wilcox is head of the department of chemistry at Birmingham Southern College. He is on leave as a National Science Foundation fellow at Cal Tech, where he is doing research work in X-ray crystallography.

Top Trombonist to Be Heard with Band and Flute Concert

Bob Marsteller, trombonist, has been added to the list of guest artists for the second Youth Band-Artist Concerts to be given at the El Camino campus theater tomorrow at 8 p.m.

Marsteller will perform with the Torrance Area Youth Band on the first half of the concert. The Los Angeles Flute Club will perform the second half. June Lusk, head of the piano department at El Camino College, will be guest artist with the Flute Club's share of the program.

Marsteller has appeared as guest soloist with some of the leading symphony orchestras of the United States. He is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music, having entered that institution on a full scholarship at the age of 16. He is first trombonist with the Los Angeles Philharmonic as well as being active in television and studio work in Hollywood. He will play the "Magic Flute" variations by Beethoven and "La Danza" by Rossini.

The Flute Club, composed of seven outstanding flutists, will perform on all of the instruments of the flute family. These include the C piccolo, Eb flute, C flute, Alto flute, and Bass flute. Their program will consist of "Allegro Spiritoso from Quartet for Four Flutes" by Anton Reicha, "Four Early American Spirituals" by William Schmidt, "Sonata for Two Flutes" by Handel, "Night Soliloquy" by Kent Kennan, "The Music Box" by A. Lindow as arranged by Poole, and "Changes for Seven Flutes" by Lowndes Maury. Miss Lusk will play three short pieces by Rachmaninoff, "Elegie," "Barcarolle," and "Polichinelle."

The Torrance Area Youth Band, conducted by James Van Dyck, will play "A Mighty Fortress is Our God," "Heat Lightning," and "Selection" from "Show Boat," "Pageant," "Tambour," and "Fandango." Student soloist on the hand's portion of the concert will include Dale Stitt, drummer, and Elbert Deffebach, trumpeter.

Admission to the concert is by season ticket. Individual concert tickets may be bought at the door. Members of the Torrance Junior Woman's Club will be ushers.

Candidate Would Eliminate Cows and City Council Junkets

"It's the Mayor's prerogative to make commission nominations..."

Dairies in residential areas have got to go, said Thirvin D. Fleetwood, 37, in announcing his candidacy for the April City Council race.

"Cows in the city are incompatible with homes," he declared, "and an ordinance ultimately can get rid of them just as we eliminated the hog farm on Madrona."

Among other changes Fleetwood would make is a cessation of out-of-state junkets by councilmen. "If they want a vacation they can take one like I do," he said.

He favors keeping the power of nominating city commission members with the Mayor.

"That is the Mayor's prerogative," he said in opposing a proposal by Councilman Willys Blount that the entire council have an opportunity to nominate commissioners.

Fleetwood is a utility worker and a member of Local 132, Utility Workers' Union of America, AFL-CIO. Born in Oklahoma, he attended schools in that state and Missouri.

Entering the armed forces in 1942, he served in the South Pacific theater and participated in occupation of Japan. He was discharged in 1945.

He worked for GM and the Veterans' Administration before coming to California in 1948.

He joined the Southern California Gas Co. in that year and since has served the Utility Workers as steward, director, financial secretary, and chairman of the legislative and political-action committee.

He was delegate to the legislative conference during 1955 and 1957 sessions of the Legislature and was delegate to state conventions of 1953, 1954, 1955, 1957, and 1959. He has been a delegate to the Greater Los Angeles CIO Council Federation the past six years and recently served as chief shop steward and vice president of Local 132.

Fleetwood has served on the Torrance Planning Commission since 1954. Named president of the Torrance Democrats Inc. in 1954, he served till 1956 when he was elected to the Democratic County Central Committee.

Welfare Agency Hunts Site for Headquarters

A need to relocate the Harbor Area Community Chest service center drew attention of Welfare Federation board members at their first 1960 meeting held last week at the Torrance Chamber of Commerce.

Glenn Koger, board chairman, reported that the present facility in San Pedro was "woefully inadequate and too far from the center of population in this area."

First action to accelerate the relocation was appointment of James Visceglia of Palos Verdes to head a committee to find land for a center.

"Object of a Center," Koger said, "is to give the best possible service to residents of the Harbor area—Torrance, Gardena, Lomita, Harbor City, Rolling Hills, Palos Verdes, San Pedro, and Wilmington and to have as many agencies as possible under one roof in order to operate more economically."

Helping Visceglia on the center relocation committee are: Frances Dastarac, Lomita; Jim Becker, Torrance and John Sonneborn and Rodney Smith, San Pedro.

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Ryan Gets Navy Research Pact

A contract to analyze vehicles capable of riding a cushion at extremely low altitudes has been awarded to Ryan Aeronautical Co. by the Office of Naval Research.

The air cushion can be generated by a ducted fan, turbo-prop drive, tip fan drive, or reciprocating engine drive.

Structures to be analyzed will range from 20 feet to several hundred feet across, and shapes will range from circular to rectangular.

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Camino Journalism Students to Interview Nixon at Parley

The El Camino delegation, all affiliated with the college newspaper, the Warhoop, will view presentation of awards to news publications of the state at a Saturday breakfast. Gov. Brown will make the awards.

Brown was the subject of the special college interview session in San Francisco, where CNPA held its convention a year ago. After lunch student delegates will tour the Los Angeles Times building and Disneyland.

El Camino representatives include Verne Christofferson of Torrance, commissioner of publications; Jack Franklin, Torrance, feature editor; and W. A. Kamrath, Warhoop adviser and journalism instructor.

Kamrath, who was a judge of CNPA contest entries, has just returned from Palo Alto where he made a presentation on community relationships before the American College Public Relations Association.
