Ten to Go

In just seven days the World Champion Dodgers will head for the sunny clime of Florida and begin spring training operations. As of this morning, club veep Bavasi has the signed contracts of three-quarters of his personnel with just ten left.

In the past few days the Dodgers have received promises to play from Johnny Klippstein, Maury Wills, Al Norris, Fred Young, and Scott Breeden, the latter two promising young rookie pitchers.

Wills Gets Raise

Of the recent signees Maury Wills is about the most distinguished. Maury received \$5000 more for his services as a Dodger. And rightly so for the young shortstop got hot with the stick during LA's stretch drive.

Wills, a .206 hitter going into the final three weeks of season play in '59, caught fire and started to hit the ball in all directions. From Sept. 8 on Maury batted .389, raising his average to a neat .260. During this free-swinging period Zimmer's replacement had a 5-hit day against the Braves, a 4-hit against the Phillies, and three days in which he got 3 hits against some of the other clubs.

Enemy of Giants

Little Maury perhaps is most noted in '59 for his success against the then league-leading San Francisco Giants. When the Dodgers swept that memorable three-game series in Frisco hustling Wills managed to get seven for thirteen during the televised affair. The team promptly voted him the outstanding player of the three-game set.

For some unknown reason, even to Maury, the shortstop hit first division pitching better than that of the lower placed squads. With just one other player on the team a switch-hitter, Maury is expected to shine as a left-handed batsman as well as a righthander.

According to Dodger publicist Red Patterson, Maury has an unusual hobby. He trains dogs with German shorthair pointers his favorite breed. When his baseball career comes to an end Maury hopes to become a fulltime trainer of field trial dogs.

Norris from LA

Ready to try and land a job with the Dodgers is versatile Al Norris, a local Angeleno singled by Lefty Phillips after the scout saw the youngster play at Dorsey High and in local American Legion play.

Norris can play any position except that of pitcher. Last year he played triple A ball clobbering 25 doubles, 5 triples and 11 homers.

Al is a rangy 6-2, 180 pounder and will be listed as an outfielder when the club begins spring training.

Klippstein a Question

Since acquiring Johnny Klippstein from Cincinnati in 1958 the Dodgers had hoped that his ailing back would heal and permit him to pitch the kind of ball they know he is capable of delivering. In late '58 Johnny was very effective appearing in forty-five games for the Dodgers. In early '59 he came in relief and won four ball games before the back began to trouble him once again. During the remainder of the year Johnny was best known as the relief-pitcher who needed relief.

Klippstein will have to work hard to stay on the Dodger staff as young rookie twirlers Ford Young and Scott Breeden are hot for nailing down a job with the world champions.



Bike Racing Returns to Ascot


