

Bible Is Tops in Blind Reading

"The Bible is the most popular book among blind people," said Ted R. Carmack of the public-relations department of Braille Institute in a talk and film presentation before the Men's Club of the Riviera Methodist Church Tuesday.

He said that whereas the average inked edition of a Bible can be bought for \$5 to \$10, a Bible in Braille has a cost of \$90 a copy.

It runs 20 volumes, weighs 72 pounds, and requires five feet of shelf to hold each copy.

He detailed the way blind emotional disturbed children are aided by a research project sponsored by the institute and gave a rundown on recreational, educational, and job-placement programs available to Southern California's blind.

Program chairman was James Long, Redondo Beach.



Temple Plans to Be Shown at Ground Breaking Today

The full plans of the new Temple Menorah of the South Bay will be revealed this afternoon at ground-breaking exercises on the site of the new building, Sepulveda Blvd. at the Redondo Beach-Torrance city lines, at 2 p.m., according to Albert Levitt, chairman of the temple's building committee.

Architect Kenneth N. Lind has incorporated the latest of building designing, including a retractable stage for the social hall. Lind received an architect's award for his most recent religious building, Temple Isaiah in Los Angeles.

Included in the master plan are a two-story classroom wing, containing 16 classrooms, with closet and storage space in each room; administration and office space including a rabbi's study, work room, and waiting room; and a large library. Part of this building will contain a large kitchen, a youth lounge for the teen-agers and for youth group meetings, a lounge for adults and for smaller social functions, and a large area for a gift shop and book store.

Surrounding a large open courtyard will be a social hall to seat about 400 persons and which converts into a junior-high-school size basketball court when the stage is folded back into the wall, and a large foyer

that leads into both the social hall and the sanctuary. Dressing rooms and storage rooms also are provided.

A modern sanctuary will seat almost 400. For special services, a sliding wall will be removed to admit worshippers in the social hall to see and hear the service. Total seating by this arrangement will be over 1000. A special robing room for rabbi, cantor, and choir will be provided off the altar area. The entire rear altar wall will be made of volcanic glass, and a menorah-candelabra, the symbol of the temple—will be outlined against this varicolored background. It will be visible either from within or outside the sanctuary.

A special important feature of the new building will be a smaller sanctuary. It is planned for use for daily worship, for smaller sabbath services, for use by the various classes of the religious school, and for weddings or other private ceremonies, such as conversion. This building will be a domed structure, reminiscent of the traditional architecture of the Jewish synagogue.

A study is being made by members of the building committee to select a panel of artists to prepare suitable outside art work to beautify the exterior and to plan for special ritual requirements for the sanctuary, such as ark, eternal light, and others. Construction is expected to begin early next month.





Bids Received on Intersection Near El Camino

Apparent low bids complete reconstruction of the intersection of Manhattan Beach Blvd. and Crenshaw Blvd. has been submitted to the Board of Supervisors by the Sheets Construction Co., Supervisor Kenneth Hahn announced today.

Seven bids ranged from \$63,478 to \$80,302.

In addition to remodeling the intersection, including elimination of dips, project will widen and improve Manhattan Beach Blvd. to Atkinson Ave. on the east and to Chadron Ave. on the West.

The intersection is next to El Camino College. More than 30,000 vehicles pass through the crossing daily.
