## Problems of Retarded Children Discussed at White House Parley

Members of the Exceptional Children's Foundation of Greater Los Angeles have their eyes on Washington and the 7,000 members of the White House Conference on Children and Youth this week.

A major concern of the conference, called by President Eisenhower to blueprint needs of the next ten years in child welfare, are the 1,500,000 retarded children of school age and the 120,000 retarded youngsters born each year.

"The discussion now going on in Washington can have a far-reaching effect upon our program for the retarded in the Los An-

geles area," said Robert D. Shushan, executive director of the unit.

"A decade of progress in services for the mentally retarded started in 1950, the year the last White House Conference took place and the National Association for Retarded Children was organized.

"Mental retardation was the third most frequently mentioned area of concern," Shushan reported. "During ten years the public has come to understand the extent and cost of a problem handicapping five million persons."
