## Cycle Season in Second Successful Week at Ascot

Off to a record-breaking start, the 1960 motorcycle season swings into its second week Friday night, April 8, at Ascot Stadium.

First postals at 8:30 with qualifying spins getting underway at 7.

The opening show drew a record first-night crowd of 6,500, indicating the popularity of the fast-moving two-wheeled racing sport in the Southland. Coming on the heels of a top season last year, cycle racing appears to be a peak of interest.

A newcomer to the Southland—Bart Markel, from Flint, Mich.—figures as one of the riders to whip in the 20-lap main event. Markel made an auspicious debut last Friday that was reminiscent of the sensational spurge of Sammy (The Flying Flea) Tanner last year.

## ECC Golfers Meet Valley

Golfers of El Camino College are walking down "Win Street" once again after a brief detour down "Defeat Lane" last week, when the six-man squad was knocked out of a stout bid for first place by the clubs of Bakersfield, 40 to 14.

The Warriors were nestled in the second-place spot Friday before going against front-running Bakersfield. The EC contingent either got lost in the rough or couldn't find the holes in suffering their second and worst Metropolitan defeat of the season.

The squad will have its next chance to ascend in Metro standings on April 8, when El Camino plays its next Metro match against L.A. Valley.

Coach Al Greenleaf's squad rebounded after its humiliating loss to the Renegades to demolish Harbor 52-2, two days later. In the Harbor match all six ECC golfers overwhelmed their opponents. Larry Martz of EC came up with the best round of the season in posting a 69 on the Harbor golf course. Martz posted a 34 and 35 to beat his opponent by 15 strokes. Other

marks turned in by EC were Rick Hull 74; Mike Stern, 77; Jack Hollis, 72; Garth Reynolds, 76; and Steve Cromwell, 83.

In the Bakersfield encounter the best round of the day by the flabbergasted Warriors was a 76 by Jack Hollis. Bakersfield's best was only two strokes better at 74 posted by Jim Ewing, but the Renegades were just unbeatable Friday.

El Camino has eight conference games remaining in the season. Camino next faces the Renegades on the final day of the season, May 6.

## Sportsmen's Show Winds Up Successful Run in Los Angeles Sunday Night

Two square blocks of camping equipment, boats, fishing tackle and every imaginable item for all recreational activities, are drawing record crowds to the 15th annual Los Angeles Sportsmen's and Vacation Show at Pan-Pacific Auditorium.

The show will run through Sunday, April 10.

Producer H. Werner Buck's outdoor spectacular has expanded this year, with the leasing of the Pan-Pacific Bowling lanes and the Pan-Pacific Theater for the run of the show.

Champion bowlers are staging bowling clinics for beginners every day, and competition matches

between national champions feature the kegling exhibition. Full color films of sporting adventures all over the world run continuously at the theater.

Public entertainment twice daily is headlined by Western Star Roy Rogers and his troupe, and the "Parade of Outdoor Champions" demonstrating their special skills in the show arena. Featured on the "Champions" show are:

Blonde Ann Marston, holder of 11 national archery titles and Miss Michigan of 1958 in the Atlantic City Beauty Contest.

Jim Running, log-rolling artist, who performs in the arena "lake."

Loral I. Armstrong, famed woman field trial trainer, and her six champion Chesapeake retrievers.

Don Allen, flycasting wizard, who uses four rods simultaneously in one display of casting art.

The huge display area, supplemented by four giant tents, houses featured exhibits including:

1. A display of mobile homes, ranging from tiny, collapsible trailers designed for minicars to rolling "apartment houses" for large family groups on holiday.

2. Boats of all descriptions, from rubber dinghies to offshore fishing craft, including the famous "Jet Stream" boat of the future.

3. Camping gear of every imaginable sort—pup tents, portable palaces for African safaris, water purifiers, transistor radios, first aid kits, air mattresses and sleeping bags.

4. The world's largest collection of fishing tackle, for everything from minnows to marlin. A score of foreign countries are represented by recreational equipment that runs from midge-sized dry flies to a six-cylinder land cruiser for off-the-road hunting in inaccessible country, shown by Toyota Motors of Japan.

Most states with recreational facilities have sent travel advertisers to staff booths to aid those seeking vacation information.

Admission to the Sportsmen's Show has been scaled at \$1.50 for adults, 75 cents for kids. Ample parking is available in adjacent lots.

More than a quarter of a million persons are expected to attend the show before it closes. The "Parade of Champions" and Roy Rogers appear at 4 and 8 p.m., with an extra 2 p.m. matinee Sundays.

## DFG Stocks Trout in 57 So. California Lakes, Streams

Despite the continuing drought that has reduced stream flows to the point that 22 Southland waters have already been temporarily dropped from the Department of Fish and Game's trout planting program, 57 Southern California streams and lakes are scheduled to be restocked this year with 1,125,000 catchable-size rainbow trout averaging eight inches in length.

Following is a list of the Southland waters still in the restocking program, with information on where each of the waters is located. Anglers are reminded that any of the waters listed here may be removed from the planting program at any time, because of unsuitable conditions or forest closures, and that some of the smaller waters listed may be stocked only once or twice or not at all. Waters that have been stocked in previous years but probably will not be stocked this year unless there is considerably more rainfall are listed separately, county by county.


