

Magic Chef Market to Feature Hot Bakery

One of the most interesting areas of the new Magic Chef Market, expected to open early next month at Hawthorne and Sepulveda in the Del Amo Shopping Center, will be its in-store bakery.

Operated by Robert M. Lehman, whose years of bakery experience have included owning and operating wholesale and retail bakeries, and designing and manufacturing bakery equipment, the bakery will be one of the stars of the show at Magic Chef.

"I want to emphasize first of all," said Lehman, "that the Magic Chef Bakery will be a hot bakery. We'll be baking all day and bringing out fresh merchandise continuously."

"We'll have a line of fancy breads, brioche and croissants, which are a rarity in supermarkets. Another specialty will be

patio items: pizza bread, and a herb roll I developed for barbecues. Plus cookies, cakes, pies, hearth breads, and finger desserts.

"There'll even be entertainment. We'll have expert cake decorators working behind a picture window during the market day. We'll take special orders for cakes, of course.

As a bonus for children, Lehman plans to give every child who comes to the bakery counter accompanied by a parent a free Magic Cookie—"with the parent's permission, of course," said Lehman, who is a father and grandfather.

El Camino Offers Course for Married Pupils Only

"We as human beings, need the thinking of the group to meet the situations that confront us today," Harold Wolpert, El Camino College psychology instructor comments in explanation of his course, "Problems of Marriage."

Limited to married persons only, the course is described by Wolpert as "strictly functional, because family relations are around-the-clock business."

The three-unit course will be offered at El Camino during the summer session and will carry transfer credit toward work in sociology and psychology.

Registration will be held June 20 for current students and June 21 for former and new students, with classes running from June 22 through Aug. 3.

As a result of student evaluations in past classes, the design of the course is based on selected areas of investigation listed as the most important in lessening potential conflicts in marriage.

"Surprisingly, economics in marriage receives more attention than the more popularly conceived notions of marital conflict," Wolpert said, "but we don't teach budget making."

In the study of marriage economics such important but little understood matters as insurance problems, G.I. benefits, Social Security, will and testaments, and credit buying are examined.

Other areas such as child rearing, in-laws, and sexual relationships are explained from discovered needs presented to the class by participating students.

"If we can teach people to recognize their problems," Wolpert said, "if we can teach them to communicate with one another, we will have done much to prevent the anguish that comes from marital conflict."

Wolpert speaks with the authority of 30 years of sociological and psychological work, as a teacher and in private practice.
