Harbor College Offers Course in Psychology

Two sections of General Psychology will be offered by Harbor College during the six weeks summer session from July 5 to Aug. 12.

One section will meet from 5 to 7 p.m. Tuesdays through Fridays, and a second section will meet from 8 to 10 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays.

The course has no prerequisites and carries three units of credit, fully transferable to other colleges and universities.

The instructor will be Loretta M. Newman, specialist in educational and clinical psychology, and head of the Harbor College reading improvement program and study clinic.

A graduate of the University of Rochester, the University of Kansas City, and Long Beach State College, she holds master's degree in music, psychology, and education.

Registration will be held from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m., and from 6 to 8 p.m. on June 29 and 30, and on July 5 and 6. No individual appointments are necessary for summer session registration.

Jack L. Wolf, chemistry instructor at El Camino College, will conduct advanced laboratory research at Long Beach State College this summer following appointment under the National Science Foundation.

The summer research is designed to give teachers professional research experience and includes study of problems in organic chemistry now under investigation in LBSC laboratories. The six-man group will also work on problems posed by the students.

Wolf, of Inglewood, has been an instructor at El Camino for the past year. He received a BS degree in mathematics and a MS in psychology from Purdue University.
