Southland Provides Fun for Everyone

Most prominent among the events on the Southland scene this week are the openings of the outdoor musical programs. However, there is something for everyone, as suggested by this schedule of events, for the period June 30 through July 10 as compiled by the Automobile Club of Southern California.

BORREGO-SPRINGS: Sun Worshippers Festival is July 9, featuring a parade of zany floats at noon.

COLTON: Thursday night "Music Under the Stars" concerts start July 7 in Fleming Park.

DEL MAR: Southern California Exposition and San Diego County Fair, including an RCA rodeo, now through July 4 at the fair grounds.

HUNTINGTON BEACH: Orange County celebration and All-Southland Beauty Review takes place at Beach Stadium on July 4. Parade, with 3,500 participants, includes military, silver mounted equestrians, 20 floats, bands. "Miss Firecracker" will be selected from 70 contestants, daylight aerial fireworks, the "Flying Circus" at 5:30 p.m., fireworks at 9 p.m.

INDEPENDENCE: July 4th program includes horse-manship competition for youngsters, midjet racing, sky diving, and pageant of Inyo County history. Barbecue and fireworks start at 5 p.m.

LA JOLLA: Five plays are being presented during La Jolla Playhouse's current season through Sept. 3.

LAKE ELSINORE: Independence Day celebration here includes Saturday night dance, Sunday afternoon rodeo, parade Monday followed by a barbecue.

LANCASTER: Children's swim races, Miss Lancaster beauty contest, husbands vs. wives softball games, fireworks, dance and dance contest are features of July 4th celebration at Antelope Valley Fairgrounds.

LONG BEACH: New York-New Jersey States Picnic is July 3 in Bixby Park. Kansas Picnic is July 10. Iowa Picnic is July 9 in Recreation Park.

LOS ANGELES: "Music Man" ends its run at Biltmore Theater July 9. The Grand Kabuki, the National Theater of Japan, is current through July 9 in the Greek

Theater. All-new program starts July 4.

Hollywood Bowl opens its season July 5 with Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra under direction of Pierre Monteux. Contralto Jean Madeira will be featured soloist. Monteux also will conduct July 7, when pianist Leon Fleisher will be featured. July 8 and 9 are Rodgers and Hammerstein Concert evenings, featuring Johnny Green, Terry Saunders, Thomas Hayward, James Hurst, Katherine Hilgenberg and the Roger Wagner Chorale.

"A Trip to the Moon" is current through July 10 at Griffith Park Observatory.

Dodgers return to Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum July 5 and 6, Chicago, July 7 and 8, and St. Louis, July 9 and 10.

NEWHALL: Arabian, Indian, Spanish and Western riders, Chinese-American Youth Band are features of 33rd annual Old West Celebration parade which starts at Hart County Park July 4. Afternoon barbeque and jockey rodeo precede evening fireworks.

OCEANSIDE: Indians present tribal dances hourly each day from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., July 9 through 17, at Mission San Luis Rey.

SAN DIMAS: National four-mile swim race, with at least 45 well-known swimmers, is in Puddingstone Res-

ervoir July 10 to celebrate opening of L.A. County's newest recreation area.

SANTA BARBARA: Semana Nautica, or Summer Sports Festival, is current through July 4. Events range from water skiing to lawn bowling.

National Horse Show and Flower Show is July 8 through 16.

TORRANCE: Powder Puff Derby, 14th annual All-Women Transcontinental Air Race, starts from Torrance Municipal Airport July 9.

Park Department Issues 13 Rules for Beach Safety

Millions of Southlanders and tourists who will visit Los Angeles' 11 miles of ocean-washed strands this summer can enjoy themselves in safety if they will observe 13 basic rules, the Los Angeles City Recreation and Park Department stated yesterday.

Pointing out that the Department judges the efficiency of its lifeguard staff on the basis of the number of rescues it doesn't have to make, Chief Beach Lifeguard Myron Cox said that the goal of the Department is to provide beach fun with safety.

Cox said that because of the cooperation of the public and the constant vigilance of lifeguards, the dearth of fatalities and near-fatalities for the past 30 years has been

phenomenal. The department provides year-round beach lifeguard service and during the summer months. Carefully screened, experienced personnel is employed, Chief Cox reported.

Following are the basic safety rules which, if followed, will avert tragedies at beaches:

(1) DON'T swim in unknown waters; look before you leap, and be sure there is a lifeguard close by.

(2) DON'T acquire a quick suntan, because of its painful and possible injurious results.

(3) DON'T spoil your beach playground by throwing glass, tin cans, paper, or other refuse on it.

(4) DON'T call for help unless you actually need it.

(5) DON'T swim near riptides; lifeguards will tell you how to recognize these dangerous currents and how to combat them.

(6) DON'T make long-distance swims unaccompanied by a strong swimmer or boat. Don't take dares!

(7) DON'T swim near piers or pilings; they cause dangerous currents and have sharp cutting edges and surface.

(8) DON'T expect the lifeguard to be your baby-sitter. A life may be endangered thereby.

(9) DON'T swim too soon after eating.

(10) DON'T drink at the beach; salt water and alcohol don't mix.

(11) DON'T overestimate your swimming ability, especially at the beginning of the season.

(12) DON'T go to the assistance of a lifeguard unless he calls for help; he can handle the situation and may have to help you.

(13) DON'T use inflated apparatus in the surf. You may be carried out to sea and be unable to return.
