serve 2500 pupils per year for 50 years. "By adding 15 or 20 acres of land to this site, it would be suitable for our fifth high school site; and it is necessary and urgent to the educational future of this community."

"It is, therefore, urgently requested that you take such steps to reverse this decision as are necessary so that this land can be put to the important educational use which the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare recommended."

"Torrance has many acres of undeveloped industrial land which are rapidly being converted to housing because industry doesn't seem to want it. In the face of this fact, your recent denial of this property to schools looks suspiciously illogical."

### Bank Declares Regular Increase in Dividends

A regular quarterly dividend of forty-five cents a share was declared on Bank of America National Trust and Savings Association capital stock by the bank's board of directors meeting today (July 19) in San Francisco. The dividend, payable August 31 to shareholders of record August 5, is at the annual rate of \$1.80 per share.

## College Expands Theater Program

The Harbor College Theater Arts curriculum, under the direction of Reuben G. Plaskoff, will be expanded during the fall semester to include twelve classes, according to an announcement today by college Dean of Instruction John A. Grasham.

New day classes to be offered will include Introduction to the Theater, Drama Digest, Stagecraft, Technical Stage Production, and Beginning Stage Make-up. Beginning Applied Acting, Intermediate Applied Acting, and Rehearsals and Performance will continue to be offered during both day and evening sessions.

All theater arts classes will be held in the college little theater, "The Starboard Theater," now being remodeled in the campus recreation area. Construction will be complete by the opening of the fall semester Sept. 12. "The new Starboard Theater will be one of the most flexible, intimate theaters in the entire Los Angeles area."

Plaskoff commented today, "It will enable us to arrange central, horseshoe, and conventional staging with a minimum of effort."

Plaskoff has had 18 years experience as actor, director, and coach in pictures, television, and theater in this country and in Europe.

He is a graduate of Ohio University and the University of Southern California, president of the American Education Theater Association of Southern California, and a member of the advisory board of the recently formed Los Angeles Civic Theater Foundation.

"In explaining his objectives in developing the local college curriculum, Plaskoff said, "Our drama program is dedicated to the fulfillment of the cultural and educational needs of our students and the entire community."

"Its purpose is to offer courses not only for the serious student of the theater, but for the individual seeking to develop his personality and build confidence through a creative art. This can have special value for the doctor, lawyer, teacher, welfare worker, or anyone whose vocation includes contact with the public."

## Torrance YMCA Announces New Summer Treks

The Torrance YMCA announced today that three new summer camp sessions have been created to serve local youth. The original schedule of Torrance YMCA Camps, serving 1,000 boys and girls, has been completely filled with waiting lists for all camps.

To provide a memorable week of outdoor fun for boys 9 to 12, the YMCA has secured space at Camp Big Pines from Aug. 13 to 20. Swimming, archery, lake-shore hikes, nature lore and handicrafts will highlight this week in Wrightwood area of the San Bernardino Forest.

For older boys, 12 and older, an adventurous caravan has been designed: Sierra Streams YMCA Caravan. The boys will travel to the finest streamside campsite in the great High Sierra wilderness area. Extending from Aug. 16 to 22, the trip will feature sightseeing, fishing, boating, hiking and horseback riding. At the conclusion of this tour, the local Y group will cross the Sierras to view Yosemite National Park.

For men and youth 14 and older, a second John Muir Trial Pack Hike has been scheduled from Sept. 2 to 11. The group will travel along the world famed Sierra trail from roadsend in the Mammoth Lakes, some 40 miles to the Rock Creek Lake area. Dehydrated food and careful preparations will enable the group to travel on steam for this extended time period in the back country.

Thus far, the Torrance YMCA has conducted five separate camps for boys and girls this summer. At the present, two camps are in session. Thirty older girls are traveling through the Monterey Peninsula area on a week-long trek. Another Torrance Y group of 24 families are visiting Yosemite Valley for a week of family fun and relaxation. The two sessions will rendezvous on July 21 for joint ceremonies and campfire programs.

## 5% Pay Hike

The budget anticipates collection of a 10 cent community service tax, legally authorized, but never before collected by the local school district. The only other factor affecting the present school tax rate would be changes in the building bond rates set by the County Board of Supervisors. Last year's tax rate was \$3.49 per \$100 assessed valuation.

The budget would consist of \$85 per cent (\$9 million) for salaries and 15 per cent for other expenses.

### Budget Breakdown

Breakdowns of the budget by categories include: Instruction, 69.3 per cent; school operations, 10.6 per cent; fixed charges (employee retirement contributions), 4.7 per cent; administration, 3.8 per cent; school maintenance, 3.4 per cent; capital outlay, 2.5 per cent; auxiliary services, 2.4 per cent; transportation, 1.9 per cent; community services, .7 per cent; reserves, .4 per cent; and food services, .3 per cent.

"This is the tightest budget we have had since the district started in 1947," the superintendent declared.

The board has called an override tax election for October 11. The district has reached the legal limit of its operating tax rate. If approved, the 50 cent override would not be effective until 1961-62.
