

United Nations Sets Tone for Summer Classes

Explosive world problems, such as the critical situation in the Congo, the problems of Cuba, Israeli removing an ex-Nazi from Argentina, or narcotics trafficking, are all getting critical scrutiny from the seventh graders in summer school at a model United Nations at Riviera Elementary School, Torrance.

Heated debates on these issues rock the meeting room. David Patterson, Congo representative, and Doug Vogl, Belgian delegate, exchange threats and insults while discussing the fate of the newest American nation.

Val Allred, Cuba's representative, often tells the delegates the reasons for her nation's actions, as do Bob Fluke, U.S. delegate, and his Russian counterpart, Henry Harlow.

To gain facts for their debates, the youngsters pore through newspapers and current magazines, as well as encyclopedias and other reference books. The classes meet in the school cafeteria which is decorated like the real United Nations in New York.

Teachers Irma Wilson and Robert McGowan guide the students in getting material. Most of the class activities are centered around United Nations activities, with youngsters writing reports and themes around this activity, and creating art work depicting phases of its operation.

Charles Reading to Aid Reading Habits of Youth

Charles Reading, 4011 W. 150th St., former high school science teacher, has been named administrator of the Torrance-Palos Verdes area chapter of the American Institute of Reading.

Teaching fundamental skills of reading and comprehension to youngsters who have problems in this field of learning, Reading will direct and administer the home tutoring plan of the Los Angeles-based Institute.

"Tests show that one-third of our high school students are retarded in reading, and are in great need of help in order to keep up in their other studies," Reading declared. Increased population growth, teacher shortage and parental indifference are contributing factors to children's inability to read, Reading added.

Highway Patrol Warns Vacationing Motorists

The California Highway Patrol suggests to vacationing motorists who are carrying camping equipment in their vehicles or are pulling heavy trailers to be sure their headlights are still in alignment.

"Extra weight in the back of station wagons, pickup trucks equipped with living quarters, and even family sedans can tilt the front end of the car enough to raise the headlights to an illegal position," CHP Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden declared.

Crittenden noted that the vehicle code provides that automobile headlights must be strong enough to light the road so that a person or vehicle can be seen for a distance of 100 feet when the low beam is used and 350 feet when the high beam is used. However, the lights must not blind an oncoming driver under any load conditions.

"Headlights that are tilted upward because the rear of the vehicle has been lowered by extra weight can blind oncoming drivers and thus be illegal," he said.




