AAU Women to Study Africa

Africa, once the "Dark Continent," but now a land of emerging nations has been chosen as the subject for two study groups of the Palos Verdes-Rolling Hills Branch of the American Association of University Women in their October meetings.

On Oct. 6, the International Relations group with Mrs. Hugh Hixon, chairman, will meet at the Palos Verdes Estates home of Mrs. George Culbertson, and on Oct. 10 the Book Section, Mrs. Dean Dunlavy, chairman, will convene at Mrs. Raymond Odone's home in Rolling Hills.

The speaker for the International Relations Study Group will be Richard Hughes, who with Mrs. Hughes lived from April 1949 to October 1955 in Liberia, where Hughes taught languages in Cuttington College, an Episcopal mission school at college level.

Mr. and Mrs. Hughes graduated from UCLA where Mr. Hughes, also, obtained an M.A. in languages. At present he is teaching English in San Pedro High School and in Harbor College.

Cuttington College was for many years the only college in Liberia and was situated on the extremely hot and humid coastal plain. It was moved to the higher and comparatively drier interior.

Although it is not an agricultural school, it is furthering the growing of such crops as coffee, cocoa, rubber, and citrus fruits on land owned by the college. It has about 200 students and a faculty of 16, four of whom are Liberians, one a Nigerian, and the rest Europeans or Americans.

Hughes will discuss the education, the culture, and the economy of Liberia and will illustrate his talk with pictures made by him and his wife in Africa.

The Book Section meeting will cover a wide variety of reports by the members who have been reading extensively, books, pamphlets, magazine articles—all concerning Africa.

Following the meeting the members have been invited by Mrs. Odone to enjoy a swim in her pool, weather permitting.
