'American Home' Is Sermon Topic

The Narbonne Avenue Southern Baptist Church of Lomita has observed "Better Program Time" during the past week. The interest has been to help plan better programs in Training Union that meets each Sunday at 6:30 p.m. Every age group was represented in the week, "Training Union Is a Family Affair."

The pastor, Robert A. Wells, will speak at the 8:30 and 10:50 a.m. worship services on Oct. 16. The subject will be on the seventh commandment in the current series of sermons "Foundations For Happiness."




WHY SMART WOMEN COOK WITH MODERN GAS:
