Machine Russian Dictionary Out

According to Electronic News, a 600,000 word, Russian-language dictionary designed for fast, economical "look up" for machine translation has been developed by the University of California. Called Rusdic, the dictionary will soon be used in conjunction with an IBM 704 computer to look up words at a rate of 125 per second.

The new dictionary is part of a machine translation program that may eventually be able to translate languages at a rate of 360,000 words per hour at a cost of about one-eighth of a cent per word, it was said. Dr. Sydney Lamb, head of the university's machine translation program, and his staff are reportedly preparing a dictionary similar to Rusdic for the Chinese language.

Officer T. Bradley Completes Special Refresher Course

Traffic Officer Ted M. Bradley, of the California Highway Patrol zone V (Los Angeles) headquarters office, has completed a 10-day, in-service training course at the patrol's Sacramento Academy. Refresher classes in accident investigation, laws of arrest, first aid, emergency vehicle operation, range firing and related subjects were among courses studied by Officer Bradley, who resides in Torrance.

He has been a patrolman since 1951, and in 1957 was named traffic safety officer for the Compton Area. In 1958 he was transferred to Zone V as traffic safety education officer.

Halloween Safety Tips for Children

Parents and motorists should take extra precautions to protect children during Halloween festivities, the Automobile Club of Southern California advised today.

Because Allhallow's Eve falls on Monday this year "Trick or Treat" antics will begin well in advance of Oct. 31, according to Robert J. Cheny, Auto Club Public Safety department manager.

"In their excitement, children may forget their safety rules and dart across streets from between parked cars," he reminded.

The masks and costumes which are so much a part of Halloween often obstruct a child's vision, adding to the need for greater alertness by motorists. Cheny advised parents to make sure children's costumes do not limit vision. "Wherever possible, school or community costume parties should be arranged to keep children off the streets at Halloween."

The following six safety tips should be enforced by parents for Halloween safety, according to Cheny: Halloween costumes should contain something white. Children should always walk on the left facing traffic in neighborhoods where there are no sidewalks. Children should be warned about making quick movements into streets. Street crossings should be made only at lighted intersections. Masks should not restrict vision. Make-up can be more fun and is much safer than a mask. Parents should accompany their children on their rounds.

Bicyclists must give hand signals, obey stop signs and use lights at night.

Waterfowl Rules Clarified Now

As a safeguard to the hunting public, Leo L. Laythe, regional director of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, and Walter T. Shannon, director of the California Department of Fish and Game, today issued a joint statement explaining the Federal regulation covering the possession of wild waterfowl taken while hunting.

The clarifying statement was issued by the two officials because the adoption this year by the State of California Fish and Game Commission of a federal regulation governing the possession of wild waterfowl taken while hunting has created considerable discussion in sportsmen's circles in the state as hunters prepared for the annual hunting season. It was issued in an effort to protect hunters from unknowingly violating the law.

The Federal regulation covering possession is as follows: "No person, other than the person who has lawfully taken such birds, shall receive, possess, or have in custody migratory game birds for picking, cleaning, processing, shipping, or for transportation or storage (including temporary storage) unless unless such birds have a tag attached signed by the hunter stating his address, the total number and kinds of birds, and the date killed."

California further restricts the Federal requirement by requiring the hunter to affix his hunting license number to the tag.

This ownership and possession of waterfowl legally taken by a hunter does not cease when a person other than the one who has lawfully taken such birds has these birds in custody. The birds are still under the ownership of the hunter as the tag attached shall indicate.

In order for a hunter to divest himself of ownership and possession of these birds, they must have been delivered by him to a post office, a common carrier, or a commercial cold storage or locker plant for transportation to some person other than the hunter. However, Section 2349 of the Calif. Fish and Game Code prohibits shipment of ducks via parcel post.
