



Five Gal Bowlers Vie for "Miss All-Star"

Marilyn Lush, Zoya Norsworthy, Eileen Maxwell, Marie Lee and Kathy Coppel have been selected as participants in quest of Gable House Bowl's entry in the Southern California Bowling Proprietors Association, Brunswick Corporation, unique contest to select "Miss All-Star."

Some 250 bowling establishments from San Diego to Las Vegas are participating to choose the gal who will reign at the 1960-61 All-Star Tournament. The contest runs from Oct. 30 to Jan. 1 with Gable House first round voting ending Nov. 13. The winner at the local house will enter competition with all other establishment winners for area balloting which will run from Nov. 18-27.

Voting values for the above girls are determined as follows: one vote for week-end play at all times and on Friday night after 5:30 p.m., two votes for weekday bowling and three votes for open play bowling after midnight.

Bowlers at the Gable House can vote for the candidate of their choice by picking up a ballot at the desk.

60 girls will emerge as area winners and will compete on a regional basis from Dec. 2 to Dec. 11. The five regional winners will vie for the title Dec. 16 to Jan. 1 with the highest vote getter to reign as "Miss All Star" and the other four finalists to serve as her court.

Form Company to Study New Flight Methods

Research into unknown and unusual propulsion systems for space vehicles will be carried on by a new corporation formed by a distinguished aero-space scientist, it was reported this week by officials of the Douglas Aircraft Company.

Donald W. Douglas, Jr., president of the aircraft firm, and J. C. Lee, internationally-noted propulsion expert, said the new corporation, Astropower, Inc., will be subsidiary of Douglas and will be headed by Lee as President.

Astropower is an outgrowth of Aero-Space Technology, Inc., a corporation formed by Lee, fellow-scientist Dr. George Moe and engineering administrator E. W. Smith.

Operations of the new firm will be governed by a board of seven directors representing Douglas and the three founders of the original corporation. Douglas, by virtue of its stock holdings, owns a controlling interest in Astropower.

Officers, in addition to Lee, include D. Moe as vice president and technical director and Smith as vice president-administration.

Douglas, Jr. and Lee said Astropower programs will include research and development of specialized ultra-high energy propulsion systems in the nuclear, chemical and electrical fields.

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
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
