Mrs. Roy J. Aspey, president of the Torrance Women's Club, announced that the club will be co-sponsoring a diabetes detection drive with the Diabetes Association of Southern California, Thursday, Nov. 17. The drive will be held at the Women's Club, 1411 Engracia Ave.

The free tests, which will be given between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. at the above center, are very simple and quick.

"It is vital that every member of our community come in for this test," Mrs. Aspey said, "because I understand that diabetes can remain undetected for years. Neglect of it can lead to serious complications, including heart disease, failing eyesight, hardening of the arteries, kidney disorders, gangrene, cerebral hemorrhage or diabetic coma.

"We are very happy to participate with the Diabetes Association in providing facilities and volunteers to help find the one in 70 Americans who may be a victim of diabetes and not know it," Mrs. Aspey said. "And since it strikes at all ages, including infants, we hope that every family comes in to take this simple test."
