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### Centuars Blast THS Out of CIF Playoffs

Culver City pulled the biggest upset of the 1960 season Thursday night by handling Torrance a shocking 38-6 loss at Centuar stadium before an overflow crowd of 5,000.

The Centuars could do no wrong as they scored the first four times they had their hands on the ball to knock Torrance out of contention for a bid to the CIF playoffs.

Two plays after receiving the opening kickoff, the favored Tartars fumbled on their own 35 yard line, two plays later Centuar halfback Alan Curr raced 25 yards on a reverse to score.

On the next series of downs, Torrance was forced to punt, four plays later Culver was on the score board again as quarterback Doug Cambell plunged three yards making the score 12-0, at the end of the first quarter.

As THS signal caller Howard Taylor took to the air early in the second quarter, he was rushed severely by a bruising Centuar line and Culver intercepted a pass on the Tartar 20 yard line.

Five plays later, Campbell scored his second TD of the night from three yards out, enlarging the margin to 19-0, leaving this reporter along with 2,000 other loyal Tartar fans shocked.

Two minutes before the half, halfback Bill LaRosse raced 40 yards on a reverse to paydirt, leaving the score at halftime 36-0 in favor of the Centuars.

Opening the second half, Culver took to the air with strange wide open formations, and linebacker Mike Tracy intercepted a Culver pass and raced to the Centuar 20 yard line, four plays later Torrance was finally on the scoreboard, when Mike Irvine hit paydirt from four yards out.

Then the Tartar defense began to look like they had in previous games holding Culver's tricky reverse plays, until Campbell tossed a 45 yard aerial to end, Mike McLean for a cinching TD. Later in the fourth quarter halfback Alan Curr scored his ninth touchdown of the season on a 20 yard reverse play.

#### PRESERVATION

Henry Hazlitt says, in a Newsweek article: "The most serious domestic issue today is the preservation of the integrity of the dollar. This requires an end to reckless Federal spending. It requires the tapering off or termination of some of our major spending programs. It requires not merely the passive consent of Congress to monetary discipline on the part of the Federal Reserve authorities, but positive Congressional insistence on such discipline. It requires removal of the interest-rate limitation on long-term Treasury bonds."

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
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
