## Savory Spaghetti Italian Style

Cook bacon until crisp. Remove from pan and crumble. Pour off all but 1 tablespoon drippings. Add mushrooms, celery, and onion; cook until tender. Stir in spaghetti. Heat. Garnish with bacon. Makes 2 to 3 servings.


## SALUTE

## Influence of Religious Justice Topic of Volume

Can religious ideals of justice and cooperation inspire business, labor and the church to undertake social reform movements?

A small group of American ministers thought so, and their activities and philosophies are reported by Donald B. Meyer, associate professor of history at the University of California, Los Angeles, in a new book, "The Protestant Search for Political Realism—1919-1941."

"At the end of the First World War, a minority of Protestant pastors sought to revive prewar enthusiasm for social reform in American society," Meyer writes.

Preaching the "social gospel," these theological and political liberals believed that true religion meant social action, and that the Christian ideals of personality, cooperation and justice could replace the capitalist spirit in industrial society.

Furthermore he states, they believed they could find enough people to put these ideals into practice.

As targets, they chose the three centers of power capable of bringing about social change—business, labor and the church.

"But, during the 1920's, they found that business was uninterested, labor was hopelessly conservative, and the church was stagnant."

The social gospel collapsed and fragmented during the depression, and then was thoroughly confounded by the New Deal.

"Later," Meyer writes, "it was re-directed by the neo-orthodox Reinhold Niebuhr, who argued that religion should be freed from politics and politics from religion in order that the two might relate to each other in a spirit of tension rather than in a spirit of compromise."

## Study New Drug As Control for Fungus Disease

The first synthesis of a chemical which may lead the way to the control of fungus disease for which no cure now exists has been accomplished at the University of California, Berkeley.

Synthesis of the chemical was described recently by Henry Rapoport, professor of chemistry, and Kenneth G. Holden, Public Health Service predoctoral research fellow.

The compound, known as prodigiosin, is a completely new type of pigment and represents a new type of chemical structure, as well. Its only distant chemical relative known thus far is vitamin B12.

Produced in nature by a common type of bacterium, prodigiosin is highly unusual in that it is both a fungicide and an antibiotic. It is the only known chemical capable of killing the fungus that causes San Joaquin Valley fever, a disease which is widespread in the American Southwest and claims a number of lives each year.

Prodigiosin, however, is too toxic to be useful as a drug.

According to Rapoport, the method of synthesizing prodigiosin may be used to produce a wide variety of closely related compounds. He is now setting out to prepare such compounds in the hope of finding one which retains the fungicidal and antibiotic proper ties of prodigiosin, while eliminating its toxic effects.


An arena theater production, the play will be given in the Green Room of the Campus Theater with curtain time scheduled for 8:30 p.m.
