

Set Bay Area Showing Of Cancer Society Film

South Bay women will be invited to take part in a statewide "saturation" showing of an American Cancer Society film which explains how uterine cancer — the second most common cause of cancer death in women — can be almost eliminated as a killer, it was announced here today.

Mrs. Charles Gulkison, film showing chairman, district 8 of the Los Angeles County branch of the society, said that 2 free showings of "Time and Two Women," an American Cancer Society film which explains the life-saving potential of the cell examination test for uterine cancer, have been scheduled here for December 7 and December 9.

SPONSORED SHOWING

The showing will be sponsored by the American Cancer Society and many local organizations in cooperation with local theater managers and projectionists.

"Inside Magoo," featuring the famous near-sighted cartoon character stumbling over the Seven Danger Signals of Cancer and through a health examination also will be shown.

The local theater at which the films will be run is the Strand, 302 South Catalina Avenue, Redondo Beach.

Screenings have been scheduled for Wednesday, December 7 at 1:30 p.m. and Friday, December 9 at 10:30 a.m.

The two films have a total running time of approximately 25 minutes, and will be followed at each showing by a question and answer period conducted by a local physician.

PROTECT LIVES

The showings in Redondo Beach are being arranged as part of an intensive statewide American Cancer program to alert California women to the part they can play in protecting their own lives against uterine cancer which last year killed 15,000 American women.

Mrs. Gulkison said that although uterine cancer is considered to be from 90 to 100 percent curable if it is diagnosed early enough, only 55 percent of its victims are now being saved.

"This needless loss of life is partly because not enough women go to their doctors for yearly checkups, including a pelvic examination and a cell examination test for uterine cancer," Mrs. Gulkison declared. "The cell examination makes it possible for doctors to detect uterine cancer months and often years before symptoms develop, and therefore to increase the chances of cure."

"Time and Two Women" is a clear and direct explanation of what uterine cancer is and why the cell examination test is so vitally important to life and health," she said. "We hope that every woman in the South Bay Area will come and bring at least one friend to one of our free showings."

El Camino Coeds prepared a festive table for the Thanksgiving feast of the autumn harvest from the products of the rich croplands of California.

Students of home economics of the college under the supervision of Mrs. Hazel Kuehn, instructor, prepared the beautiful centerpiece and the dinner crowned by the turkey roasted to a deep brown and garnished with orange-cups of cranberry relish and surrounded by vegetables of green and golden color.

New to California, Mrs. Kuehn was quick to adopt its distinctive products in her holiday menu planning. She joined the El Camino staff as instructor of home economics in September.

FESTIVE MENU

Colorful and tasty, the menu which she recommends follows:

For the Sparkling Casaba Melon cut melon into slender wedges (8 to 10 from each melon); pare rind off, scoop out seeds, drizzle pulp with lime juice, garnish with a few pomegranate seeds and a wedge of lime. A flavorful starter for the harvest dinner.

The rich, brown Roast Turkey will develop a deep color by rubbing the entire bird with butter before roasting and by basting every half hour with melted butter.

Roast at 325 deg., allow 30 minutes for each pound of weight. Buy ¾ to 1½ lbs. per person to be served — the smaller the bird the greater weight per serving: 20 lb. turkey renders ¾ lb. per serving; 8 lb. turkey renders 1½ lb. per serving.

DRESSING

Try a truly California Gold Coast Dressing. For a 10 to 12 lb. turkey saute ¼ cup finely diced tender. Stir in ½ tsp. salt, 1 tsp. mixed herbs, 1 tsp. worcestershire sauce. In a bowl combine 4 cups slightly dried bread crumbs or cubes, 2 cups diced tart (Continued on page B-5)
