**Mayor Advocates Hiring Torrance Residents First**

Mayor Albert Isen Tuesday announced a plan for combatting a possible recession in the Torrance area by advocating the employment of local residents by preference.

"The plan would be in accord with union contracts and seniority rights," Isen said, "and was approved, in essence, two years ago by labor, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Junior Chamber."

The Mayor quoted a dire warning, made by Irving H. Perluss, employment director of the state, that "unemployment in California is worse now than during the '58 recession."

Perluss reported that he saw no "quick improvement," and that the latter month of \$60 is expected to show even greater unemployment. Recovery is expected in the spring or early summer months of 1961.

**Community Chest Drive Nets 65 Percent of Goal**

Torrance's Community Chest campaign now stands at 65 percent of its \$32,046 goal, but greater efforts are required, according to Harold Frenz, Torrance City Chest chairman.

"Greater efforts by our leaders," said Frenz, "must be made during the final weeks of this campaign. Our various unit, division and section chairmen must encourage those volunteers who are not producing. We will not reach our goal unless we have asked everyone in Torrance to give."

United appeal in Torrance is broken down into four main divisions, Commerce and Industry, Advance Gifts, Business and Residential.

Torrance Commerce and Industry campaign, directed by Ralph Morris, has now achieved 53 percent of its quota. Torrance Advance Gifts chairman Dr. Robert Jackson reports 75 percent of

his quota has been collected. John Schwartz, Torrance Business chairman, reports 47 percent of his quota.
